ments which Mr. King and his associates are making the people have the answer in the events of the past year, which still are in the memory. Mr. King, for example, is loudly demanding that "Mr. McKeen keep his hands off the National Railways" evidently believing that his own action last year in destroying the independence of the Railway Commission for the sake of influencing western votes is forgotten. It is well known that the order issued by two members of the Railway Commission last September on the eve of the announcement of the election, which granted Eastern Crows Nest Rates to westbound freight was made at the dictation of the then government. Mr. King was the only Prime Minister since the Railway Commission was established to interfere with its independent jurisdiction over railway rates.

The attempt of Mr. King, Mr. Dunning and other Liberal leaders to make light of the scandal of the Customs service is also meeting with poor success. Mr. Dunning is arguing that the public platform that the charges made by Hon. H. H.
