To quote one: in 1913 the Missouri Agricultural Experimental Station conducted a test to show the value of a good ram. Seventeen ewes were bred to an inferior scrub ram and seventeen to a fairly good registered ram. The lambs sired by the pure bred ram made 26.6 per cent more daily gain than those sired by the scrub.
