—FRACTURES ARM IN FALL— Mrs. Charles Macdonald, Hanover Street, Summerside is resting comfortably in the Prince County Hospital following an accident which occurred on Thursday evening when she slipped on an icy street, fracturing an arm.—S.

Horton's canning plant at Murray River was destroyed by fire Saturday night. There was no official estimate of the amount of loss; it was expected to exceed \$50,000. The steel-covered wooden building was built in 1939. It was about 80 feet long by 26 wide.

Last evening in St. Dunstan's Basilica after the Lenten sermon which was delivered by Rev. Bernard Quinn, O.M.I., of Ottawa, His Excellency the Most Rev. FIRE INSURANCE RATING— Mr. Charles A. Beer, manager of the Prince Edward Island Board of Fire Underwriters, has announced that "Schedule Rating," a method of rating buildings for fire insurance purposes will go into effect in Charlottetown this year. Should the City in the meantime install a modern fire alarm system, Mr. Beer said, the fire insurance rate under the new "Schedule Rating" system would be appreciably reduced with the result that a considerable saving to the property owners of the City would be effected.
