



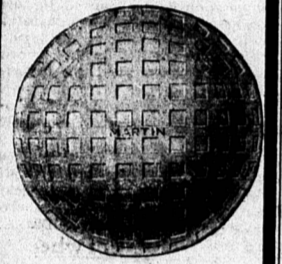

GOVERNMENTAL IMBECILITY

Another incident occurred in parliament the other day which again revealed the utter imbecility and incapacity of the King government.

On this occasion the government was so bewildered that it actually defeated itself by a vote of 89 to 26 but got back to business by another of those accommodating rulings of Mr. Speaker Lemieux who has on more than one occasion "ruled" the government out of a hole.

On this occasion when the Government moved to go into supply, W. C. Good, Progressive, Braintree, moved in amendment for an inquiry into income tax and business profits returns.

As to the grievances of the employed, it is not easy for an outsider to pronounce upon them. The new schedules, devised by the Civil Service Commission, are a substantial advance upon the old scale: the objection of the men is that they do not make up for the loss of the bonus, despite that the cost of living, which the bonus was given to take care of, has not come down.

When a government shows no respect for its laws or for itself, when it violates parliamentary procedure and gets itself out of the hole by an unprecedented ruling by its Speaker, how can they expect respect or confidence from the public?

THE POSTAL STRIKE THREAT

The problem of adjusting salaries of the Post Office employees has been dogged by bungling from the beginning says the Ottawa Journal. The question was buffeted about between Government, Civil Service Commission, and Audit Board for weeks.

Notes By the Way

The number of preventable fatal accidents in most countries is large. Dominion Government statistics show that in 1923 there were 448 fatalities of this class in the Maritime Provinces, 227 of which occurred in Nova Scotia, 185 in New Brunswick and 31 in Prince Edward Island.

The first Safety League, designed to prevent accidents was formed in Ontario in 1914. Its success in the good work led to the incorporation of the Canadian National Safety League, to which the federal government made a substantial grant from which the Ontario and Quebec and Maritime Leagues are assisted in their educational work.

A weak Administration, divided in its councils and unstable in its purposes invites such troubles as the strike of Post Office employees. The King Government has neither the wisdom nor the courage to deal with the situation which their own extravagance, favoritism and indecision had created.

The rank and file of the old service were treated differently. They were under control of the Civil Service Commission. Their wartime bonus was taken away properly enough for the war is over five years past, but the unfairness of making the big salaries bigger and cutting the small ones rankled in the bosoms of the latter.

MEXICAN DIGNITY HURT

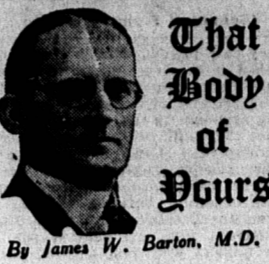
It is now quite evident that Mexico has some dignity for the Mexican government has officially notified Great Britain that the latter's latest communication was "an affront to its dignity."

CANADIANS IN LONDON

THE OFFICE OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR CANADA IN LONDON WEEK BY WEEK

During the week ending 4th June 400 visitors called at the Office out of which 254 obtained interviews and 145 registered. The High Commissioner for Canada learns that the Cattle Breeding Conference to be held in Edinburgh from July 7th to 11th inclusive is international in scope, no special consideration being given to local problems.

Arrangements have been made for the Right Honourable J. H. Thomas, Colonial Secretary, to visit the Canadian Pavilion at Wembley on June 12th. The Canadian High Commissioner and the Agents General for the various Provinces will be present to receive the Colonial Secretary.

The United Tanners Federation (26, St. Thomas Street, London, S. E.), have notified the High Commissioner that they are anxious to afford facilities to Dominion visitors who are interested in leather. If any Canadians will communicate with the Manager of the Federation he will be most happy to enable visitors to see and learn as much as possible of the Leather Industry in Great Britain.

Sir Edward Grieg will address the British Empire Exhibition of International Affairs on the Empire Policy on the 1st July at 8.15 p.m., in the Council Chamber, Old Council Hall, Spring Gardens, S. W. 1, when members of the Institute will be pleased to see any Dominion visitors at the meeting.

The High Commissioner for Canada has been advised by the Principal of the London County Council General School of Arts and Crafts, Southampton Row, London, W. C. 1, that he will be glad to show their exhibition which opened on the 2nd June to any educationists or other visitors from the Dominion who may be interested in Art and Craft education.

The Secretary of the East India United Service Club has forwarded the following notification to the High Commissioner: "Subject to introduction and election by the Committee a limited number of visitors to England during the time of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley will be admitted as temporary members without payment of any entrance donation or subscription. Communications on the subject should be addressed to the Secretary 16, St. James's Square, S. W. 1."

The opinion of the Canadian Fruit Trade Commission that the Apple crop in general, while not a bumper one, will be very much larger than last year, is the result of a personal visit to the West of England and authentic reports received from other sections. Excellent yields of pears and anticipated with good cherries, though affected by frosts in some districts, the outlook for plums is doubtful but some improvement on last year is expected.

Two shipments of Canadian Cattle have been received. The arrival at Avonmouth of 50 head of Cattle destined for the Rodeo at Wembley, caused a rather amusing misunderstanding. In the first place the authorities issued an order prohibiting debarkation on the grounds that the beasts were too rangy and would lower the standard in respect of other Canadian animals in England. Upon the position being explained opposition was withdrawn and the Cattle sent on to Wembley.
