CANADA'S POSITION IN THE EMPIRE.

In Canada there arises from time to time discussion of the future of this country. There are some who would like to see a federation of the Empire brought about. There are others who think national independence will be our ideal and ultimate future.

Great Britain neither dominates nor seeks to dominate Canada. In a federated Empire we must become subject in many important matters, notably our tariff, to the will of the other and more populous portions of the King's dominions.

But nobody in Canada that we know of desires annexation and few desire imperial federation. Our present status and surroundings, with

the full measure of self-government which we enjoy leave little to be desired. And yet by very gradual stages, as most patriotic Canadians desire, the Empire is being drawn together. The result bids fair to be something that the world has not yet seen, a great Empire framed upon a noble ideal as was set forth by Mr. Balfour in a recent speech. We quote:

"A coalition of free and self-governing communities, who feel that they are never more themselves, never more masters of their own fate, than when they recognize that they are parts of a great whole, from which they will draw inspiration and strength, and to which they can give inspiration and strength, and that each lives its own life and is most useful when it feels itself in the fullest sense a self-governing entity which yet has a larger whole to look to, on whom it can rest in time of trouble, from whom it can draw experience, to whom it can look, whom it can aid, and from whom it can receive aid. That is, an ideal coalition, congregation, of free self-governing communities which has never yet existed in the world, but of which we see the beginning at the present time, and of which only our posterity will see the full fruition."

THE ROYAL VISIT TO IRELAND.

Royal visits to Ireland have been by no means frequent. It is mentioned that after the battle of the Boyne in 1690 no English Sovereign visited Ireland until the time of George IV in August, 1821. He was very cordially received by his loyal Irish subjects and was deeply affected thereby. On being presented with an address he said to the multitude, "Gentlemen, I approached your shores with pleasure; I quit them with regret. May God Almighty bless you till we meet again."

It was about 28 years later that Queen Victoria visited Ireland in 1849 and held court at Dublin Castle. She had then been twelve years Queen and had visited Scotland as early as 1842, and in 1845 she and Prince Albert had occupied their highland palace there to which she was afterward so much attached. This rendered necessary the visit to Ireland, which had been delayed owing to the disturbed state of the country. She was very loyally received, and again visited the country in 1853, in 1861 and at intervals thereafter.

The recent visit of King George and Queen Mary was made much earlier in his reign than were the visits made by preceding Sovereigns, and also under more favorable conditions. The late King Edward took a deep interest in the Irish people and was known to be warmly in favor of the successive acts of legislation by which so much has been done to secure the present relative prosperity and content which now happily prevail among them. To these measures and the early prospect of Home Rule is due the more kindly and affectionate feeling of the people which marked the recent visit.

It has long been a moot question why there should have been for more than half a century past a royal residence in Scotland and nothing of the sort in Ireland. Also why more frequent visits should be made to the Continent by British Sovereigns than to the Irish Kingdom. It is to be hoped that under the happier relations now subsisting and in prospect any seeming neglect of Ireland by royalty in the past may be fully atoned for and royal visits across the Irish Channel may be made at frequent intervals. King George and Queen Mary have begun well in that respect as in every other.

NOTES.

Our own Minto is about to leave Sydney for a surveying trip in Hudson's Bay. It is farther from Sydney to Churchill than from Sydney to Liverpool, but the Minto's voyage will be practically all on the coastal waters of this big Canada of ours. Dirt, dirt, straw litter, banana skins and choking dust, with an old rusty stove, full of ashes, deposited in the gutter—such was the outlook along Sunnyside and St. George St. North yesterday afternoon. Surely the very heart of the town might be kept a little more tidy in the tourist season. And where, oh where was the watering cart? If cleanliness is next to godliness, as has been said, let the Street Committee awake, lest we lapse into the dirt of heathenism.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's trip from the hour of his landing at Quebec has been comparable to a royal progress. Men of all parties, races and creeds have joined together in great haste to do him honor. Few if any men that Canada has ever produced have been able to arouse such enthusiasm as Sir Wilfrid. In that regard he has no rival in the broad Dominion, and it counts for much at election times.

An appalling story comes from the new mining region of Northern Ontario, where the forests are on fire around the mines of gold and silver which have lured thousands into that country. Despatches tell of six hundred men, women and children driven by the flames into a lake, where two hundred were drowned. Others have perished in the flames, and the property loss is very great. It is to be hoped that later news may prove the figures to be exaggerated. No such loss of life directly attributable to fire had before occurred in the history of Canada.

BEAR STORY FROM TRURO

TRURO, July 10.—A bear story of some interest was told here tonight by Wilbert Lynds, of McCollum's settlement, North River, about eleven miles from Truro. This morning the wife of a neighbor of the father Logan McCollum called out from the doorway of her home that two large bears were in a field not far from her house. Lynds and Logan McCollum proceeded at once to investigate, the latter, who is a member of the Truro Rifle Company taking with him his Lee-Enfield rifle and a number of cartridges. The place where the bears were last seen was pointed out to them. As the direction of the wind was in their favor the hunters lay down and waited developments in a depression of ground about two hundred yards from a clearing, into which the bears had gone.

Presently one of the animals appeared leisurely crossing the field. McCollum adjusted the gun strap about his arm in true marksman fashion, took aim and fired. The bear was hit and rising on his hind legs clawed the air and bellowed, then turned and fell spread eagle on the ground. Bear number two emerged in the opposite direction and was passing rapidly away when Lynds, who wished to have a shot endeavoring to get his bearings, so to speak, but his attention was drawn by the sudden revival of bear number one which arose and started off.

The two men then undertook to finish their first victim and came upon him in a brook struggling in the throes of death. Lynds again took after the mate, but so quick was the animal's movements that he was unable to get within easy shooting distance, and the shots fired proved incorrect. It was impossible to remove the dead bear, and measurements were taken. He was an enormous brute, eight feet in length, estimated to weigh 600 pounds.

IN MEMORIAM.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ellis.

The following clipping is taken from a Foxboro exchange of June 24: Our community was saddened when on the afternoon of Tuesday, June 20, news came from Taunton that Mrs. Elizabeth Ellis, one of Foxboro's most estimable women, had passed suddenly away in Taunton on that afternoon. Mrs. Ellis was apparently in her usual health when she left her son's home, George R. Ellis, corner of Come Avenue and Pleasant Street, and before leaving she visited some of her most intimate friends here and expressed her pleasure in a prospective visit among relatives in Taunton, Attleboro and then Prince Edward Island, the place of her birth 69 years ago, and from whence she came to New England many years since. She has resided in Foxboro 27 years.

Deceased was the widow of Judson Ellis, who was called from her side by death nearly twenty years ago, and was the daughter of George and Ann Smith. For a great many years she had been a devoted member of the Methodist denomination. Soon after their services closed here she affiliated herself with Bethany Church. Here she was a member of the Watchful Circle of King's Daughters, and of Mrs. Mary N. Phelps' Sunday school class. In all her residence among us she has shown the same rare virtues and noble Christian character. Her wealth of tender affection, her generous, self-sacrificing spirit, her charm of conversation full of "treasures old and new," stored from a life devoted to her Master, made her loved and welcomed everywhere, the source and spring of this was her deep, devout, simple, trustful Christian faith—a faith which has kept her in hours of great sorrow and has given her the happiness and peace which the world cannot give.
