MEDIATION PROPOSED.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13—Mediation in Mexico rather than intervention by the appointment of a Pan-American Commission was urged today upon President Taft, Senator Cullom, of the Foreign relations Committee, and Representative Flood, of the Foreign Affairs Committee, by John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American Union.

The commission, which it is suggested, should seek to bring about a re-adjustment of Mexican affairs, would be composed of a statesman from the United States, an eminent Latin American diplomat now in Washington and an influential Mexican.

A TRAGIC LOVE AFFAIR.

UNITY, Sask., Feb. 13—Mrs. Anton Christanson, wife of a Norwegian farmer living 12 miles southwest of Unity, was yesterday shot and fatally wounded, and her daughter, Annie, brutally beaten with a flatiron by Lars Peterson, a young Scandinavian who resides on the next quarter section. Jealousy was the cause. Two bullets took effect in the head of the older woman and her life is only a question of a few hours. The girl, though terribly injured, will, it is thought, recover. Peterson is still at large, but the Mounted Police are hard on his trail and his capture is expected shortly, especially as he is without money and the entire district is alarmed and on the lookout for him.
