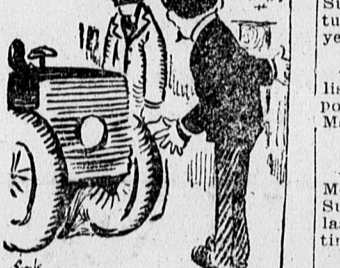

By 9 o'clock the morning Row is rapidly emptying. People ride or walk away conscious that they have had the best of the day. It is one of the greatest delights that London has to offer, in the enjoyment of which His Majesty has led the revival.
