**IN MEMORIAM**

MR. ALEXANDER FINLEY

At Cambridge on Sept. 2nd, 1921, after a short, but very painful illness, Mr. Alexander Finley, an esteemed and valued citizen, passed away from this earth to join the ranks of the redeemed in the Heavenly Home.

Mr. Finley was a man of sterling character, genial disposition and endowed with true Christian principles. He was a loving husband an affectionate father and a good neighbor.

Mr. Finley had enjoyed good health and worked at his trade till about two months before he died, when he was stricken with that dread disease, cancer of the stomach.

Everything that medical aid could do was done but death claimed him and he departed this life at the age of sixty-seven.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Peter's Road, a regular attendant of the Cambridge Sabbath School when at home, and a charter member of Cambridge Lodge, No. 112 I. O. G. L. In all these places he will be greatly missed for his timely words of counsel and advice. A carpenter by trade he has left many monuments of his faithfulness and his workmanship in the and the surrounding districts. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing wife, two sons, Howard, residing in New Glasgow, N. S. J. Russell, on the homestead, two daughters, Mrs. J. L. McKinnon and Mrs. Hayden Van Ickstine both residing on Peter's Road, also two brothers, William, James, Henry, John and George, all living in the State of Massachusetts, and one sister, Mrs. W. Taylor in New York, besides a number of other relatives and a host of friends. The last two brothers named arrived home on the Wednesday before he died and remained home till after the funeral. His son, Howard paid him a visit about two weeks before he died and had gone back to his home in New Glasgow, but returned again for the funeral. His two daughters lived near their old home and visited him often during his illness.

The funeral which took place on Sunday, Sept. 14th, was one of the largest, if not the largest ever held in this community, about one hundred and thirty carriages followed the remains to the Murray Harbor North cemetery. The funeral services were conducted both at the house and the grave by Rev. J. A. Greenlee of Georgetown, assisted by Rev. Mr. Thorpe of N. S. The I. O. G. T. also conducted their funeral ceremony at the grave.

Then he recalled Marcia's declaration: "It is all right for millionaires—but excuse me!"


