### 6-YR. OLD GIRL KIDNAPPED IN ARIZONA

By Guardian's Special Wire) TUCSON, Ariz., April 25.—June Robles, six year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fernando Robles, Mr. and Mrs. Bernabe Robles, one of Pima County's wealthiest citizens, was kidnapped as she was returning home from school here this afternoon and held for \$15,000 ransom, police reported.

The little girl was picked up by a man in a "little black car" about three o'clock but it did not become known she had been abducted until some hours later. A small boy, Rosendo Estrada, appeared at the Robles Electric Company, operated by the girl's father, with a note telling of the kidnapping and demanding \$15,000 ransom.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 25.—The Senate placed unanimous approval today on the proposal of Hon. W. H. Dennis, Halifax, calling for Federal co-operation with existing agencies working toward a greater stimulation of tourist traffic. Members after member arose to give enthusiastic endorsement to the sentiments contained in the maiden speech of the Senator from Nova Scotia. ### TAXATION MEASURES ARE CHANGED

N. S. Gov't Abandons Plan For Tax on Telegrams — Levies to be Made on Chain Stores.

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 25.—The Nova Scotia Government has abandoned its plan for a five cent tax on all telegrams transmitted between two points within the province, Premier Angus L. Macdonald told the Legislature tonight. Representatives of the companies had impressed upon him that the tax would be felt very heavily, he said, so it was being withdrawn because a similar tax was already being collected by the federal government.

### Will Consider Aliens Bill
