The Teacher's Study Group was organized in O'Leary Oddfellows Hall on Friday, November 14th.

Mr. Merritt Callaghan gave a brief talk on the new Improvement Plan for schools, stating that the Department will pay one half the cost of any improvement. The maximum grant is three hundred dollars. Arithmetic and Silent Reading.

"What are some useful language exercises or games for grades one to four?"

"What number work games do primary children enjoy most?" It was suggested by Mr. Lewis MacKenzie that we see some actual lessons taught next spring at the Teachers' Annual Convention in Charlottetown, rather than listen to speeches stating how a teacher should teach a lesson.

The globe, professional magazines, the sandtable, the hectograph, the bulletin board and other teaching aids were also discussed. After this interesting discussion the meeting was then adjourned.
