METHODIST FINANCIAL DISTRICT MEETING

The Financial Meeting of the Ch. Town District of the Methodist Church was held at York on Wednesday, 4th inst. The first session opened at 10 a. m. Rev. R. G. Fulton, chairman of the District presiding. Those present (besides chairman) were: Revs O. H. Peters, (Associate Pastor,) Ch. Town, J. Heaney, B. A., Cornwall, F. H. Littlejohns, York; S. D. Webster, Winslow; Henry Pierce; B. A. Pownall; W. J. Donville, Montague; E. S. Weeks, B. D., Murray Harbor; K. Kingston, B. A., Mt. Stewart.

The laymen present were Col F. S. Moore and Hy Smith, Ch. Town; Harry M. Hyde, Cornwall; J. Matthews, Covehead; John Boundy, Winslow; David Ross, Montague; Frank Conrad, Souris.

Besides the above brethren Rev. G. M. Young, President of the N. B. and P.E.I. Conference, Frederick N. B. and Rev. George Steel, D. D., Superintendent of missions, St. John, N. B. were present. The question of a Missionary Campaign on the District was carefully considered and it was agreed to begin the work on Sept. 22. The opening services to be of a distinctly spiritual character as the inaugural effort of the campaign. The Methodist Church in Canada has set as its objective in Missionary givings, the splendid sum of \$1,000,000 for this year. Last year \$800,000 was the point reached. The amount that this District was asked to make its objective is \$3,700, this being \$427 in advance of last year. The suggested allocation for each circuit is:— Ch. Town \$2241; Cornwall, \$497; York, \$101; Winslow, \$116; Pownall, \$178; Vernon River \$122; Montague \$117; Murray Harbor, \$168; Souris, \$109; Mt. Stewart, \$112.

The above is an increase of 15 per cent over last year. The missionary grants recommended to the missions on the District are— Montague, \$315 ; Souris, \$410; Mt. Stewart, \$330. It was recommended that Winslow receive a grant of \$300 from the Sustenance Fund, York, \$100; Vernon River, \$50.

The question of a missionary in situ in Ch. Town on Nov. 10, 11, and 12th, was endorsed by District. A public meeting was held in the evening, when the addresses were given by Rev. G. M. Young and Dr. Steel. A resolution was placed on record expressing the sense of loss the District has sustained in the death of the late Rev. J. L. Dawson, B. A. (Pat. please copy)

FOX TAX

Sir:—"Subscriber" in your issue of the 2nd would compel all ranchers to pay the Government tax of 1 1/2 per cent on all stock and pelts sold. Now, there is another aspect to the question. How about those concerns that pay no dividend to the unfortunate shareholders? Would it not be more equitable if the tax was collected on the surplus after the shareholders had received some small return on their outlay say 5 per cent or so? Some directors take especial care to charge it to the shareholders anyhow. Again, "Subscriber" knows a "lot of good honest men in the fox business." My, yes, and there are others not "so good."

What about the watered stock in some of the ranches? What about directors charging shareholders—who paid for foxes—from the \$150 to \$200 a pair per annum for their keep? If there were only a dozen pairs or so one could understand it; but when it comes to 30 or more pairs its simply extortion. Suppose the ranch is on a farm the farmer attends to his farm and looks after the foxes as well, with perhaps a little help.

I know ranches that are conducted for the benefit of the shareholders where the charge is not half as much as the above, and the foxes as well fed, if not better. So the extortioners haven't a leg to stand on in that respect. "By their deeds shall ye know them." I am Sir, etc. "DISGUSTED" Box 252 City.
