ON AUTO TRIP.—Messrs John McLaughlan, E. C. McDonald, Benj. Carter and Peter McDonald left yesterday morning on an automobile trip, visiting the Dalton Sanatorium, thence to Summerside.

THE ARANMORE.—The S. S. Aranmore docked in Charlottetown yesterday at 11.10 a. m. She brought about 75 passengers and seven car loads of freight including a car of cracked corn and a car of midlings and bran, a car lime, three cars of salt, a car of sugar.

FIRE YESTERDAY.—The fire brigade had a call out about 9.30 yesterday morning for a slight blaze at the Davies Hotel on Great George St. It was caused by a lighted oil stove standing too close to the wall which became ignited and started to burn quite briskly. The firemen with the chemical engine were quickly on the scene and the timely use of a tank proved very effective and saved the room from a flooding.

ALMOST A TRAGEDY.—The danger of children playing around the train in the Charlottetown station yard was shown yesterday. Three or four very small boys who should have been somewhere else, climbed upon the steps of a train slowly moving down the yard. One of them trying to climb the steps fell beneath it and the wheels passed within an inch or so of going over him. A railway man, who happened to appear on the scene just as he fell was almost certain the child had been killed and was relieved to see him scramble away to safety, after the train had passed. Parents, living in the vicinity of the railway should certainly see to it that their children are not allowed to wander into such places of danger.

SCHOOL WORK.—The semi-annual examination of Stanhope school was held on June 16th in the presence of a large number of parents and visitors. The pupils were examined in the various branches by their teacher Miss Blanche Raynor assisted by Mr. Frank McCabe, Miss Gladys Ross, Miss Katie McCabe and others. At the close of the examination several well-merited prizes were presented to the pupils. Following this the Beaver Club gave a well-rehearsed programme, consisting of dialogues, recitations, etc. All expressed their appreciation of the interest of the examination, as the pupils in the opinion of all, made remarkable progress during the term. Candy and cake, kindly furnished by the mothers of the pupils, was passed around to the children and grown ups present. The following address was read to Miss Raynor, Dear Teacher—We the pupils of Stanhope School, learn with regret that you are about to sever your connection as teacher of said school. We hereby take the means of expressing our satisfaction of the very capable manner in which you have imparted your knowledge of education to us pupils entrusted to your care. We find that during your short stay with us you not only endeared yourself to us but have won respect. We have also found you ever ready and willing to assist in all good work suggested in behalf of war purposes. We will also say that when you are next consigned to duty in the teaching profession they will find you a teacher of exceptional ability, as one having a thorough knowledge of the present method of teaching. And now dear teacher, you will please accept the accompanying gift, not for its intrinsic value but as a remembrance as you look back to the time you taught in Stanhope school. A handsome five-dollar brooch was gratefully received and acknowledged by Miss Raynor.

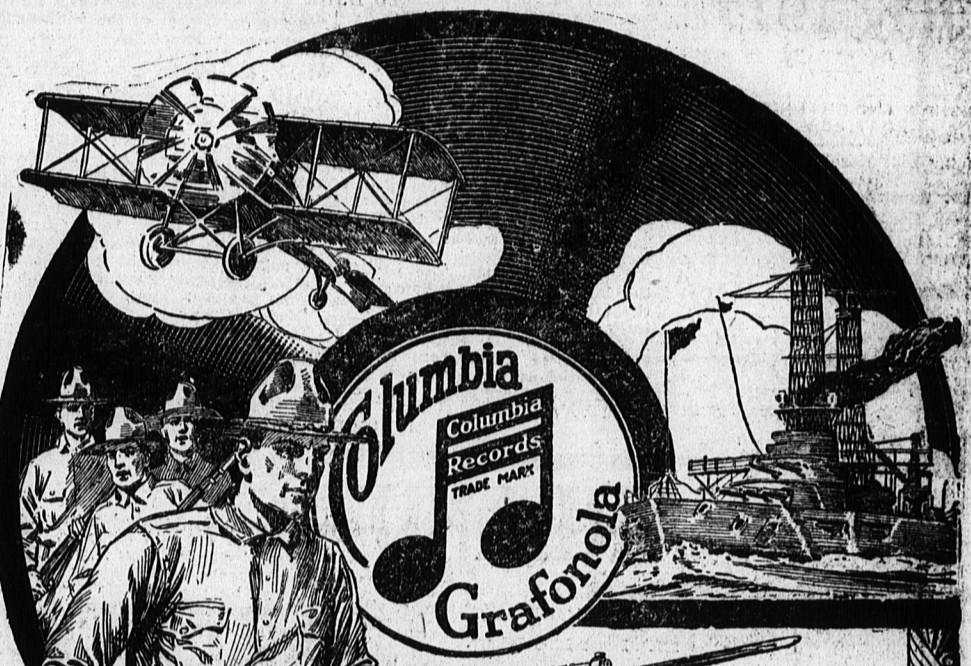
