**Racing Opening Famous Classic Lacks Standout**

**NOTHING TO WORRY OVER SAYS PLUMLEY**

"Much Ado About Nothing," Claims U. S. Member Referring to Proposed Air Base.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The recent international flurry over a proposal to establish a United States air base near the Great Lakes was described today by a leading Congressional student of military affairs as "much ado about nothing."  
"We were just trying to do something that Canada already has done," added Representative Charles Plumley (R. Vt.), member of the house military affairs committee which was reprimanded by President Roosevelt for making public testimony of an army officer about the proposed air base.  
After saying it was "to be regretted" that testimony given in confidence by Brigadier General Charles E. Kilbourne—concerning establishment of a "camouflaged" air base near the Canadian border—should have been made public, Plumley insisted talk of international complications was "a tempest in a teapot." Then he added:  
"I suppose you know that Canada already has six air bases near the American border. We have never said anything about them because we looked upon Canada as an ally. In fact, we would think Canada a poor neighbor unless she had national defence machinery which could in the event of difficulties with a common enemy be used to our common advantage."  
Plumley said his information was that Canada had air bases at Camp Borden, Trenton, Ont., Winnipeg, Vancouver, Ottawa and Casamouth, N. S. To illustrate, he remarked that Trenton was 65 miles from the United States border and Vancouver only 25.

**Urge More Men To Teach Boys**

LONDON, May 3.—There is a shortage of more than 20,000 British schoolmasters—approximately only one schoolmaster to every 50 boys—but there is one schoolmistress for every 25 girls, and there is a growing feeling that more men are needed in the teaching profession in the United Kingdom. More than 5,000 classes of boys, in addition to upwards of 50,000 mixed classes, are being taught by women.  
These facts were revealed by W. C. McHarris, headmaster of a London County Council school, in his presidential address to the London Schoolmasters' Association, as an argument for the employment of more men teachers in British elementary schools.  
"One of our main objects is to secure that all boys over the infant school age shall be taught by men," said Mr. McHarris. "We consider it just as important that all girls shall be taught by women. The girls are assured of their rights."  
"It is the ambition of every boy to become a man," he continued. "For his natural development, it is essential that after the infant stage he should make masculine contacts."

**Potato Starch Development Is Urged**

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 4.—Frustrating against what is termed a discouraging attitude taken by Dr. G. S. Whitty, Chairman of the Potato Research Committee, toward potato starch development in Canada, Premier L. F. D. Tilley of New Brunswick announced today he had asked Hon. R. B. Hanson, Minister of Trade and Commerce to look into the matter.  
"I have asked Minister Hanson to take this matter up because it seems to be a move to influence the public against potato starch development," the Premier said.  
He pointed out that New Brunswick with extensive potato-growing areas is vitally interested in Canadian manufacture of potato starch.  
Dr. Harold Hibbert, industrial chemist at McGill University stated a short time ago there was not a single product now made from corn starch that could not be made from potato starch, the Premier added.  
Dr. Whitty is head of a joint committee appointed by the Federal Department of Agriculture and the National Research Council to find new uses for Canadian potatoes.

**STRING BEANS ITALIENNE**

Drain a can of string beans, put in a saucepan with 2 tablespoons of butter or dripping, a teaspoon of grated onion, 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley, 1/2 teaspoon salt, about 3 tablespoons broth; cover and let become very hot, shaking the pan occasionally to avoid burning, also adding more broth if necessary. Beat the yolk of an egg; add 2 or 3 tablespoons of grated cheese and 1 tablespoon lemon juice; mix thoroughly and stir through the beans, but do not allow them to boil, or the egg will curdle.

**Four Killed In N.B. Highway Accident**

WOODSTOCK, N. B., May 5.—Four persons lost their lives early today when their automobile failed to make a right-angle turn at the foot of McLean's Hill, eight miles from here, and after crossing a narrow field, plunged into the Meduxnekeag River.  
The four victims, only occupants of the automobile, were: Joseph Shaw, 24, of Somerville, N.B.; Gordon Shaw, 22, of East Brighton, N.B.; Jennie Gartley, 22, of Watson Settlement, N.B.; and Margaret James, 20, of Lindsay, N.B.  
The accident is believed to have occurred shortly after midnight when the party were returning from Watson settlement where they spent the evening.
