Premier Meighen's Speech

LONDON, June 29.—Premier Meighen's speech on the Japanese alliance entirely occupied the morning session of the Imperial Conference. This afternoon Premier Hughes of Australia will give his views. It is understood the proposal was made that the question of renewal of the treaty should be postponed several months, in which case it automatically should continue in order to enable the Canadian and Australian premiers to return home to consult with their colleagues and if necessary to have referendums of their people to uphold or reject the proposals settled at the Imperial Conference. The discussion of Premier Meighen's future principles respecting what ought to constitute the voice of the Dominions in the foreign policy of the Empire are already called arrived at no definite conclusion. It is understood that Lloyd George while frankly subscribing to all four propositions presented the suggestion that the demand that the advice of the Dominions on all matters exclusively affecting them be final might possibly lead to complications and would have the effect of dividing the Empire into water-tight compartments. Further than that nothing was said or done that could be regarded as definite.
