Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Settlers by proxy or Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homestead in good standing may present a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after carrying homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be selected for cultivation under certain conditions. NEW GORY, C.M.G. 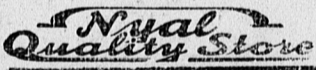

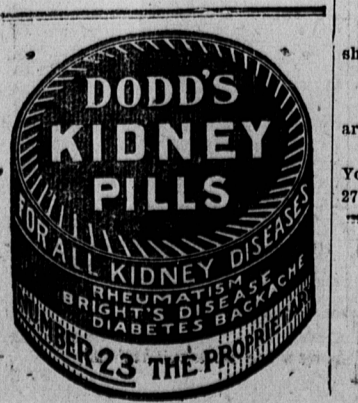

HOW THE WAR ENDED

The following letter was received from Gertrude L. Trainor from her brother Lieut. Clifford Trainor who has been on active service nearly two and a half years, one of the brave officers of the famous 26th lately transferred to the 5th F. M. B.

Nov. 11-11-18 DEAR SISTER,—Just a few lines to let you know I received your letter a few days ago and was glad to hear from you and to know all are well at home.

I received the boots O. K. they are all right and fit fine.

Say Gertrude how are you getting along, I suppose you are still at home on account of the flu, is it very bad down there. I also had a letter from mamma and May. May appears to be having quite a good time out west, I think it a good place for a teacher.

Everyone is going wild here today, we have quit firing at 11 a.m. this morning, an armistice has been signed. At present we are in a Belgium town and the people will do anything for us. When we drove the Huns out and entered the town, the women and girls all rushed out of their hiding places and cellars embracing and kissing every soldier, some running with cups of coffee and beer, some crying and laughing with joy, it was a grand sight and I believe the war is over after many years of hard fighting. Still I expect it will be some time before we get back home, probably a year.

Well, I must close for now Hope to hear from you soon again I close.
