U. S. TRAINING SHIP SINKS, ALL SAVED

Gopher is Lying in About Thirty Six Fathoms of Water

ON WAY TO BOSTON WHEN SHE SANK

Was Listed by Navy Department as Obsolete Gunboat

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The U. S. S. Gopher, a training ship attached to the Ninth Naval District, was sunk today in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during a gale, according to a message received by the Navy Department, which said there was no loss of life.

The ship went down in 36 fathoms of water, said the message, which was sent from Quebec and signed "Signal Service." The Gopher was listed in the official "ships data" of the Navy Department as an obsolete gunboat. She displaced 840 deadweight tons, was of wooden construction throughout and was built at New York in 1871. Her last station was Toledo, Ohio, as a reserve training ship with the Ninth District.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 22.—Ohio naval reservists officers here declared tonight the U. S. S. Gopher was not on cruise when she was sunk. She was being towed from Montreal to the Boston Navy yards and manned by regular Navy officers, they said, and no Ohio naval reservists were aboard. The boat was being towed into the yards, because she was no longer suitable for salt water cruising, since she had not sufficient fresh water tanks.

FRANCE TAKES FIRM STAND ON EVACUATION QUESTION

PARIS, August 22.—The repatriation note to Britain in answer to that of Lord Curzon, declares: "France will not change her attitude on evacuation. To ask her to do this would be to justify the attitude of Germany, and in the words of Lloyd George before the Supreme Council in March 1921, it would be the victors who would pay the cost of defeat and the vanquished who would harvest the fruits of victory."

ROYAL WELCOME EXTENDED TO THEIR EXCELLENCIES

Following the Informal Reception in the Legislative Chamber Yesterday Morning, When Addresses of Welcome Were Fittingly Replied To Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Byng Spent A Busy Day In Social Engagements and Everywhere Were Made Royally Welcome. Yesterday's events in connection with the visit of Their Excellencies Baron and Lady Byng started at 10.30 a. m. when an informal public reception was held in the Legislative Chamber where addresses of welcome on behalf of the Province and the citizens of Charlottetown were given by Premier Bell and Mayor Jenkins, and responded to by His Excellency the Governor General. Their Excellencies were accompanied by the other members of the Vice-Regal party, Miss Walpole, Major Willis O'Connor, D. S. O., Capt. Hon. F. W. Erskine, Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D. S. O., Aides of Camp to His Excellency, and Major Hodgson private secretary.

There were present His Honor Lieutenant Governor MacKinnon and Mrs. MacKinnon, His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson and Mrs. Matheson, Premier Bell and members of his Government, Mayor Jenkins and Mrs. Jenkins, Hon. J. E. Sinclair, Mr. P. and Mrs. Sinclair, Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, Mr. P. Arthur Newbery, I. S. O., Col. Peake, A. D. C., to the Lieutenant Governor, Capt. Palmer, private secretary and a number of other ladies and gentlemen who had the pleasure of personally meeting Their Excellencies at the conclusion of the formal addresses.

At the close of the ceremony in the Assembly Chamber the Vice-Regal party proceeded to the Executive Council Chamber where they viewed with great interest the confederation tablet which was explained to them by Chief Justice Matheson. At 5.15 p. m. His Excellency received a large number of returned soldiers in the reception room and conversed very genially with them recalling old times at the front and questioning them as to their period of service and the various battles in which they were engaged.

85 GO DOWN WITH CRAFT

Japanese Submarine Sinks at Dock After Trial Trip

TOKIO, Aug. 22.—The newest Japanese submarine, just returned from a short trip, sank this morning at the Kawasaki docks at Kobe and 85 members of her crew missing are believed to have lost their lives. The captain, chief of four, five dock yard engineers and four other naval officers were saved.

The cause of the accident has not been determined. Engineer Yanagawa, who was aboard the vessel as a representative of the builders, was among those saved. He said the submarine had completed her trial trip and come to the surface when, listing heavily she started to sink. The captain ordered all the openings closed. Before his orders could be carried out, however, the water rushed in and the vessel sank.

WHITE BREAD USELESS

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Sir Alfred Fripp, at a meeting in London of representatives of the Trades Union Congress and the Medical Council of the People's League of Health, asked that special attention should be directed to the need for education on health at the Trades Union Congress at Plymouth next September. Sir Harry Baldwin said nearly every disease could be caused through the neglect of the teeth, and one of the commonest causes of bad teeth was incorrect diet. He condemned white bread, which formed two-thirds of the diet of poor families, and said it was ought to be put upon white bread and applied to make wholesome bread cheaper. Not only was white bread useless as a food, but it was actually harmful.

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REICHSBANK'S HEAD SUBMITS RESIGNATION

Rudolf Havenstein Summoned Before Chancellor Stresemann

HAS BEEN PRESIDENT SINCE YEAR 1908

Socialists Claim Direct, ors Failed to Stem Mark's Fall

LONDON, Aug. 22.—A despatch to the Central News from Berlin says Rudolf Havenstein, president of the Reichsbank, has resigned.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Reuter's Berlin correspondent, in a despatch to night, credits Socialist parliamentarians with the statement that Rudolf Havenstein will resign shortly as head of the German Reichsbank. Havenstein is said to have been summoned to meet President Ebert and Chancellor Stresemann.

For several weeks there have been insistent demands by the United Socialists for the retirement of Herr Havenstein as president of the Reichsbank, and of the managing directors of the institution, on the ground that they failed to devise any financial reform measures which, the Socialists believe, would have prevented the mark's collapse.

Vorwaerts, the Socialist organ, on August 17, declared it was intolerable that the Reichsbank administration methods could be pursued and persons allowed to remain in office "in the face of the distress of almost the entire Reichstag and wide circles of the German people."

It added that unless Havenstein and Otto Von Glasesapp, vice-president of the Reichsbank, tendered their resignation within three days, the Social Democratic Party would demand the immediate convening of the Reichstag to deal with the matter.

Herr Havenstein has been head of the Reichsbank since 1908.

Misunderstanding In Can. Branding Protests

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Stories of protests made in Canada against branding cattle that are to be shipped to England and the cruelty of this process with threats by officials of S. P. C. A. to arrest anyone who attempts to carry on electric branding have been received in London with some astonishment and British officials maintain these complaints are founded on a misunderstanding.

The president of the National Farmers Union said today that British regulations do nothing more than demand that all store cattle shipped to this country shall be indelibly branded and that the method of branding is left entirely to the shipper in Canada.

At the present time all western cattle are branded and have been for years past and the same condition is now required for all cattle from Ontario and eastern provinces.
