Big War Job Done
By Canadian National

 Freight and passenger, that developed during the year as the tempo of war quickened. How vast that flow has been, may be gauged by the following tabulations:

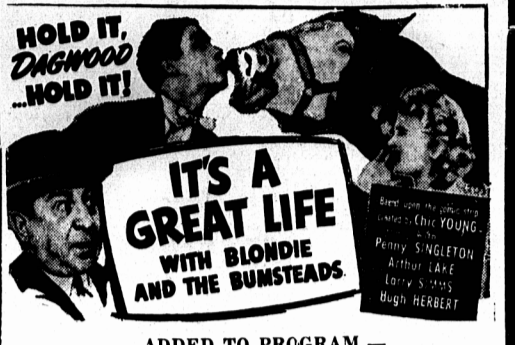

Further understanding of the 1943 operating performance of the system is to be gained through knowledge of the fact that the volume of business recorded above was handled by a staff which only numbered 75 per cent more than in 1942, with a decrease of 0.2 per cent in the number of locomotives owned and with increases of only 2.4 per cent and 1.6 per cent respectively in the numbers of freight and passenger cars owned by the company. increased war traffic on the Canadian National Railways in 1943 was handled with 16.6 per cent fewer locomotives, 15.5 per cent fewer freight cars and 4.7 per cent more passenger cars than was the traffic of 1917, a comparable year of the last World War. During the year the company received delivery of 28 locomotives, 2,757 freight train cars and 59 passenger cars. Thirty-seven additional locomotives and 6,400 freight train cars were ordered during the year but were not delivered. The track and road bed were maintained in a safe operating condition, despite serious shortages of manpower and the system centralized traffic control was extended on a portion of the line that carries a heavy share of the transportation burden.
