Misses Elsie and Katie MacKay, students of P. W. C., spent the Thanksgiving holidays at their home in De Sable.

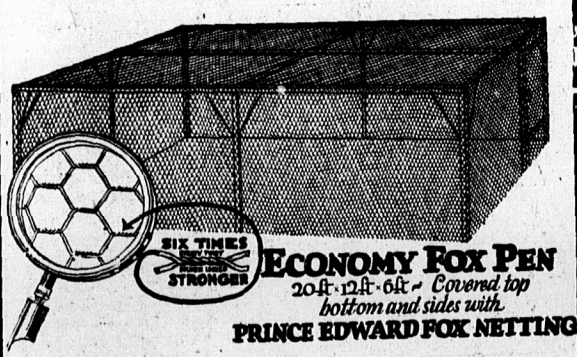

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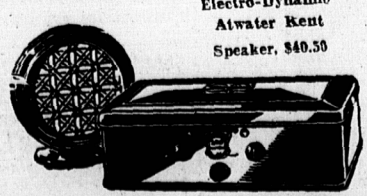


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Table Model 55 Screen-Grid Receiver, using 6 A.C. tubes and 1 Recliner. \$110.50 (less tubes)

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
