## Red Wings Draw With Rangers; Shut Out Americans 2-0

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings outplayed New York Americans and young John Mowers scored his first goal in senior company as the Wings won a National Hockey League game by 2-0 tonight before 10,000 fans at Madison Square Garden.

The team that Jack Adams rebuilt by the addition of fresh blood from the minors looked again, as it did Saturday night in coming from behind to tie the New York Rangers 3-3 here, as though it will be one of the factors in this year's race.

Gas Gesebrecht, the game's star in defence, opened the scoring early in the second period when the puck shot under Earl Robertson's outstretched arm. Syd Howe was in on the play for an assist, while Americans were pressing hard to get the equalizer. Detroit forced a scrimmage in the Americans' zone. The puck came speeding out to Eddie Wares who netted a 1-0 factor. Don Grosso and Syd Abel, who forced the scrimmage, received assists.

## Canadiens Come From Behind For 4 - all Tie With Black Hawks

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens came from behind to gain a 4-4 tie with Chicago Black Hawks tonight, and pick up their second point of the National Hockey League campaign.

Canadiens were trailing 3-0 early in the second period, but came sweeping back to tie up the game in the third, and then hold off determined Hawk rushes in the overtime session. A crowd of 15,287 persons watched the game.

The deadlock left the Hawks still undefeated in their last four games, and tied for second place with Detroit. It was the second tie game for Montreal, which had dropped three starts in between the ties.

## Three Teams Still Unbeaten

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A wave of upsets shook the United States football world Saturday, knocked Notre Dame off the unbeaten list and missed Cornell's big red squad by exactly six seconds.

Still riding high when it was all over were Minnesota, Texas A. and M., Boston College, Stanford and Tennessee, all like Cornell, unbeaten and untied in a comparatively easy schedule.

Notre Dame finally came a cropper before Iowa. The score, 7-0. Boston College spotted Georgetown 10 points in the first five minutes and then handed the Hoyas their first defeat in 24 games, 19-18.

Dartmouth had Cornell beaten 3-0 on a fourth-quarter field goal until Walter School gave Bill Murphy a pass in the end zone for the winning touchdown with six seconds to go.

Texas A. and M. routed Rice 25-0 and now faces one hundred-Texas—in a drive for a second successive southern title and a possible bid to the Rose Bowl.

Minnesota clinched the western conference championship by riding roughshod over Purdue 33-4 Saturday, leading straight for the Pacific Coast crown and the Rose Bowl, once more uncovered a brilliant offense and tripped Oregon State 28-14.

In the south, Duke and Auburn were victims of amazing upsets and Alabama just barely made the grade against Georgia Tech, 14-13. Duke was upset by North Carolina 6-3 while Louisiana State won a 21-13 triumph over tough Auburn.

## Leafs Beat Bruins 4-1 And Canadiens 4-2 In Weekend Games

BOSTON, Nov. 17.—(CP)—The Toronto Maple Leafs, paced by Tony Stanowski, their star defence-man, out-skated the Boston Bruins for a 4-1 National Hockey League triumph tonight before a 12,000 crowd at the Boston Garden.

Stanowski opened the Toronto scoring about half way through the opening period when he sliced the length of the rink and circled the net before backhanding the puck through a narrow opening in goalie Frankie Brumsek's cage. Dave Schirmer clinched the game for the Leafs in the second frame when he countered with Billy Taylor and Reg Hamilton assisting.

Billy Cowlie saved the Bruins from a shutout with an unassisted tally but shortly before the middle session ended, Hank Guldup and Taylor each countered to run up the Toronto score.

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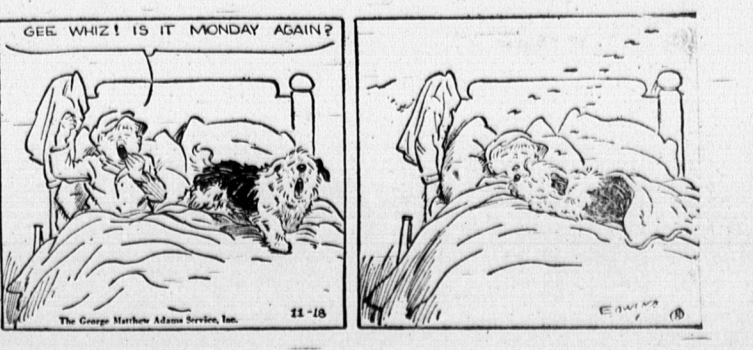
