DEADLY HATPINS.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 3.—Percy Vandylke, a visitor from New York entered a motion picture theatre, pushed his way along a row of seats occupied mostly by women sat down and instantly leaped into the air yelling. He sat down on a number of long sharp hatpins in the hat of a woman in front. This woman's escort immediately leaped upon Vandylke and there were signals of panic when the police were called. Vandylke was found to be seriously injured and was taken to a receiving hospital.

THE STRIKE SEASON OPENS AUSPICIOUSLY IN NEW ENGLAND.

BOSTON, May 3.—To enforce their demands for more wages, fewer hours or both, in eleven cities or towns in New England, a total of nearly 5,000 men are on strike tonight. In other cities or towns strikes are threatened and in central and western Massachusetts 4,200 trolley men are only awaiting the sanction of their national union officials to go out. The trolley men ask higher wages.

In Massachusetts cities and towns—Worcester, Fall River, Lynn, Gloucester, Gardiner and Winchester—more than 1,000 men have walked out. In Rhode Island the total is 3,000 or more in Providence, Pawtucket, New Bedford and Auburn. In Maine, Portland and Waterville have 600 union and non-union men idle, with a strike of eighty moulders imminent.

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TELEPHONE SYSTEMS IN BIG BUILDINGS.

Nothing better illustrates and emphasizes the vastness of the telephone system of Greater New York and its complexity than a few figures on the "vertical" telephone plants, so called, in some of the largest of the "sky-scrapers." In the Singer building for instance, there are two hundred and thirty miles of telephone wire, and the ultimate number of telephone instruments therein is thirteen hundred; the Broad-Exchange has two hundred telephones, the City Investment building carries four hundred and fifty miles of wire and eighteen hundred telephones; when the installation has been completed in the Metropolitan Life there will be six hundred and eighty miles of wire and about two thousand instruments; and the Hudson Terminal building will carry seven hundred and fifty miles of telephone wire and more than three thousand instruments. In all these five New York buildings carry two thousand three hundred and sixty miles of telephone wire and very close to ten thousand telephones. There are scores of sizable and well-known cities in the United States the telephone system in any one of which does not include so many miles of wire or so many instruments as are in use in the Broad-Exchange building at New York.
