Triple Tubes to Link France and Britain.

Work on the English channel will be begun next spring, according to authoritative information direct from London and Paris.

Premier Lloyd George soon is expected to place the British government's stamp of approval upon the project, and preparations to start boring under the water will be put under way.

The tube will reduce the time of crossing the channel from an hour (by boat) to 20 minutes by tunnel train. Passenger and freight traffic will be handled, and the cost of construction is placed at \$125,000,000, with an annual maintenance charge of \$2,000,000. Annual net revenue is estimated at \$7,000,000 based upon present travel.

Three tubes will be bored, two for use of traffic, and one for drainage purposes. The traffic tunnels will be 32 miles long, with 24 miles under water. The tunnel railway line will be 37 miles in length. Traffic tubes will be 18 feet in internal diameter, lined with iron and concrete. The drainage tube will be smaller and will be between the other tubes, and slightly lower.

Six years will be occupied in construction work, tunnel engineers state. The work of digging or boring they assert, will be comparatively easy as the channel has a chalk floor through which boring machines can make fast headway. Fast headway in this instance means five feet daily progress each way. Tunnel boring will be done from both the British and French sides. The drainage tunnel will be the first bored, according to present plans. Drills will drive through the chalky stone, the debris being carried back by belt conveyors to waiting electric trains. After this tunnel is bored work on the upper two tunnels will begin. Six years are allotted for the three.

Engineers expect little water trouble, except from possible underground streams, as the tunnel system will be kept as well beneath the floor of the channel. In mid-channel the chalk roof of the tunnel will be 150 in thick, impervious to water, easily bored and removed.

In the center of the system the tubes will be depressed for a mile so that either government may flood the tubes in times of national peril. This is in accordance to an agreement between France and Great Britain entered into Jan. 16, 1875, which also provides that terminals shall be under control of the governments.

It was shortly after this agreement that work was started at Shakespeare's Cliff, near Dover, and at Sangatte on the French shore of the strait of Dover. The borings had gone 2,009 yards on the French side and 2,300 yards on the British side when the British government became frightened at the invasion possibilities of such a tunnel connection with the continent and stopped the work in 1882.

These borings will be continued or new ones started. Starting at the surface several miles from the channel, the tunnel will slope down until the tunnel railway reaches a depth of 325 feet below water level. The maximum grade for a short distance will be over 90 feet. The average grade from end to end will be 26 feet.

Each traffic tunnel will be wide enough to permit a regulation train passing through, one tunnel being used for northbound trains, the other for southbound. Connecting diagonal openings between the two tunnels will permit cars being switched from one track to another at any point in the tunnel. Air will be driven through each tunnel in the direction of traffic. Only electric trains will run through the tunnels.

Railroads of France and England may use the tracks, and trains will run direct from London to Paris and other continental cities. Trains may be run each way every ten minutes. Engineers say 12,000 workers will be needed on the job, half at each end, working in three shifts, day and night, to finish it in six years.

PRACTICAL METHOD CARING FOR HARNESS

Please give me a formula or directions on how to oil and brighten up a used harness. It is in first class repair but needs to be made better in general appearance. W. C. C. The book entitled, "Farm Knowledge" gives the following excellent discussion of the care of harness:
"At the outset, it should be said that a harness cannot be properly cared for unless one has a suitable place in which to hang it. In damp stables it molds quickly. The presence of mold indicates that moisture is taking the place of the oil upon which the life of the leather depends. A harness should not be stored where the ammonia from the manure can reach it. However, in regularly clean, airy workhorse stable, most of us prefer to have the harness hung on a hook back of each horse, or by means of a rope the way on the post, at the rear of the stall partition. In stables where a number of teamsters are employed too much time is wasted in going to and from a central harness room; such a room should be provided, however, for the storing of supplies and extra sets of harness. In this room should be a bench and materials for making small repairs. Valuable harness should be kept in light cases in a room where there is some artificial heat."
"At least twice a year all work harness should be entirely taken apart (particular attention being paid to the straps at the buckles) and then

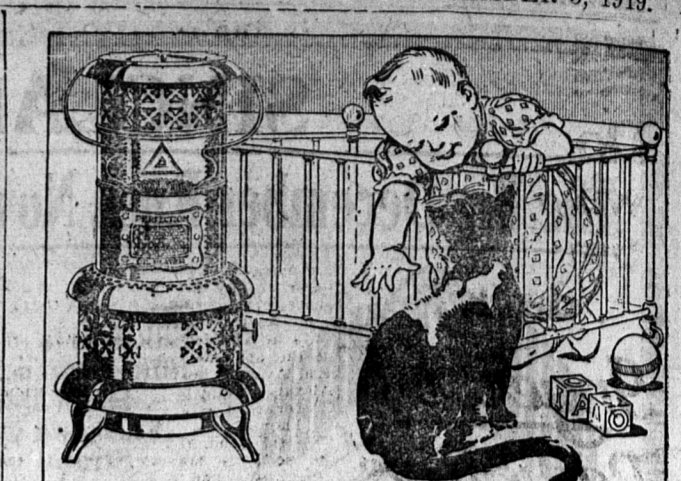
