The United States Trotting Association has released list of suspensions as of May 1st, 1949. This list is sent to track secretaries and judges in the Maritimes and of course to all districts of the U.S.T.A. The suspensions number thirty-seven and include the following... suspended for unlawful winnings; suspended for ringing; suspended for abusing horses in a race; suspended for two years; expelled for racing a horse under change of name; suspended for unlawfully cashing cheque of owner; barred from all tracks for practices detrimental to the best interests of harness racing; suspended indefinitely for racing horse under wrong name; suspended for change of name; expelled for using improper, profane and abusive language to starter and judges; expelled for striking starter in judge's stand.
