CHARLOTTETOWN MAN HEADS TRUST CO.

Mr. Oswald A. Hornsby Now President of Trust Company of Cuba.

Oswald A. Hornsby, vice-president of the Trust Company of Cuba, was elected yesterday president of that institution to succeed Norman H. Davis who becomes chairman of the Board of directors. Mr. Hornsby has been acting as president of the Trust company during the last two years or since Mr. Davis left here at the beginning of the war to give his services at a dollar a year to the treasury department of the American Government.

President Hornsby has been with the Trust Company of Cuba since its foundation in 1905, he having left the Royal Bank of Canada, then, where he was joint manager with F. J. Sherman, to assist Mr. Davis in the organizing of the new financial institution. Mr. Hornsby became vice-president then, and it is recognized that his efforts and talents contributed in large measure to the extraordinary success with which the Trust Company has met during the fourteen years of its existence.

Although Mr. Davis is now chairman of the board of directors, it is

not likely that he will be able to take an active part in Cuban affairs after some time to come as his services are being required by the government of the United States. With Herbert Hoover, he was appointed by President Wilson to represent the American Government on the Supreme Council in relation to the relief work in Europe and he has since been appointed by President Wilson as the financial representative of the United States Government on the aristocratic commission.—The Daily Post, Havana, Cuba, March 20.

The Trust Company of Cuba has a capital of \$500,000 and a reserve fund of \$600,000.

It is one of the strong financial institutions of the island of Cuba. Its present President is a native of Charlottetown, and his wife is a Halifax lady.

President Hornsby was for some years in good financial training in the Royal Bank of Canada in Charlottetown and Truro; and the result is seen in his present distinguished preferment and promotion in financial circles in Cuba.

Poultry Association, and needless to say the meeting was a very happy one.

Capt. Leightizer arrived in Canada by the S. S. Empress of Britain which reached St. John on Monday.

The rapid advancement he made in being promoted to Captain and placed in charge of a battery stands as evidence of his efficiency.

His first years of the war were served under Lieut.-Col. W. B. Prowse, D. S. O., Charlottetown, who is classed among the most capable artillerymen of the Canadian army. With this battery Captain Leightizer served through all the important engagements until, at Amiens, he was so severely wounded that slight hope was held for his recovery. The official

records had him down as "died of wounds," and the Captain had the questionable experience of reading his own obituary in a London paper.

Recovering from his wound late last summer he was able to get back to the front line in time for the big offensive in the fall and was among the first to enter Mons at five o'clock on that memorable morning in November.

Before coming to Charlottetown Captain Leightizer paid a short visit to Moncton where he resided for some time before joining up with No. 2 Battery.

He will take a well-earned rest here before going back to the railway city to reside.

Captain Leightizer's many friends

here will be delighted to see him again. He was a well-known figure in hockey and football in pre-war days.

His wife, who lived in England for three years during the war, it will be remembered, arrived home in Charlottetown some time ago accompanied by their little daughter.

Capt. Leightizer reports having had a very pleasant trip across the Atlantic.

Another soldier who arrived home last night was Lieut. Jack McKenna, who was also a No. 2 Battery man and received a commission in one of the Imperial regiments.

Lieut. Walter Smith of this city, who was expected to arrive last night did not come.
