# Flowing Conservative Tide In N. B.

## Smashing Conservative Victory In New Brunswick

### Premier Baxter Returned With Overwhelming Majority, The Liberal Opposition After Strenuous Fight Securing Only 17 Out Of 48 Seats, Mr. Jones Liberal Leader Being Defeated.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., June 19—The government, led by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, was victorious in the general provincial election held throughout New Brunswick today. Complete results gave the Government 31 seats as against 17 won by the Opposition headed by Wendell P. Jones, who went down to defeat in his own constituency of Carleton. The Speaker of the House, Hon. J. L. O'Brien and the Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, contributed to the six seats gained by the Opposition, the former losing in Northumberland and the latter in Albert. The only independent candidate nominated lost his deposit in Moncton City as did the two Opposition candidates running in Saint John County. The standing of the House at dissolution was, Government 35, Opposition 11, vacant seats 2. The list of candidates successful in today's election follows:

## RECALLED TO PARIS

OTTAWA, Ont., June 19—Hon. Jean Knight, French minister to Canada since 1928, has been recalled to Paris to take over the post of chief of press services in the Foreign Affairs Ministry. Announcement of the minister's appointment to the position was made known today. Hon. Mr. Knight will likely say adieu to Canada within a fortnight. Henri Courcier, secretary of the legation, will be charged de affaires pending appointment by the French government of a new minister plenipotentiary to the Dominion.

## LARGE LIQUOR SEIZURE IN PRINCE CO.

### 49 Five Gallon Kegs Rum, 50 Cases Whiskey Found In Woods At Mt. Carmel.

A big seizure of liquor was made at daybreak Thursday morning in the woods at Mt. Carmel by Customs Officers Platts and McDonald and Prohibition Officers Miller and Mann. In a cache in the woods covered up with brush was hidden forty-nine five gallon kegs of rum and fifty cases of whiskey. The officers have no clue as to the owners of the liquor. It took them some considerable time to transfer the seizure into automobiles and a truck. The liquor was brought into Summerside about 11 o'clock that morning and stored in the cellar of the Customs House pending instructions from Ottawa.

LATER—Twenty more cases of whiskey were discovered by the officers later in the same hiding place.

## ADMIRAL BYRD IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 19—Aerial conqueror of both ends of the earth, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, set foot again today on lower Manhattan from which he sailed sixteen months ago on a pilgrimage of exploration into the white wastes of Antarctica. Surrounded by sea and sky and on the land by a roaring welcome in which planes and harbor craft and cheering thousands joined he departed from the city welcoming tug Macon to receive from the city of New York the third and by far the most boisterous greetings it has tendered to him for his achievements of exploration by air.

## SHOCKS MAY PROVE FATAL

The men, employees of the electrical department of the New Welland Ship Canal, were attempting to erect an extension ladder at the open air control system which supplied electric power for the bridge and two adjacent locks, when the ladder touched high tension wires.
