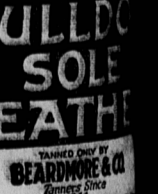
"Has your mother a toothbrush?" "No sir." "But how do you know the use of toothbrush?" "We sell them, sir."

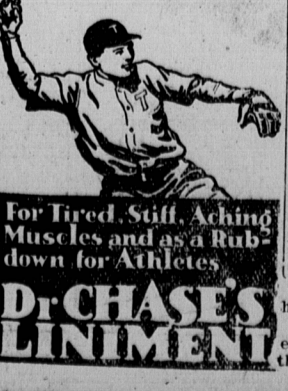


PLENTY OF WORK AND EATS IN RUSSIA

"This sums up the opinion of Sir Donald Mann, who has just returned from a visit to the Land of the Soviet, as to the situation in Russia today, Petrograd impressed Sir Donald as an empty house. It has only half its former population. The city is greatly run down, but repair work has begun on the streets and they are starting to build the houses."
