I.O.O.F. Was Founded 123 Years Ago Tomorrow

Review of history of organization given by member of local Lodge.

The following article on the occasion of the 123rd anniversary tomorrow of the founding of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows was prepared by Mr. George S. Ryan of Charlottetown:

"Anniversary Day has again rolled around, and the members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows gather together with their Rebekah Sisters and friends to fittingly celebrate the 123rd year of the founding of our order on the continent of North America.

"Like all other organizations, the Odd Fellows feel very heavily the pressing need to save the freedom and the mode of living enjoyed. They are willing and anxious to place the weight of influence, power and finance to be assembled within the ranks of the society behind each and every effort for the salvation of the democratic form of government so well understood and enjoyed in American homes.

"Our main objection to Fascist and Nazi rule is the fact that it prevents an individual from adopting freedom of purpose and exacts instead a severe discipline that imposes the need of hardship and fear. Thus it would seem, the Nazi and Fascist as well as the Socialist parties so called are not parties at all but highly self-disciplined societies. Some of them have been able to make a pretense of agreement with the church, and this has prevented a total collapse of moral discipline and the consequent disintegration of its total destruction.

"We have an almost new viewpoint of the world, and the order holds firm to its religious principles and in so doing must lend its assistance to the restoration of a firm and lasting Christian ideal upon which to firmly establish our principles of peace for all times.

"Our members have known for many years the advantages of organization. They have before them the history of the Order as it entered into its administration and the service they expected to render to mankind by the united effort of its membership. They have been asked to join hands in a common service that may be where fraternal aid is needed, and in this labor of love commanded by our Divine Master, they have come in contact with many of the trials and witnessed many struggles being waged by our less fortunate members as they contact the experience of life. Therefore fraternalism and to have served in many a capacity as is expected of them. So now at this period in the history of the world when every country is engaged in a war for its existence, we must now realize that changes are necessary in the general attitude of the ordinary citizen and must consider just how and of what material the new order must consist.

"The Fundamental Difference. "When we look carefully at the world conflict from our common point of view, we can see that we consider to be the element producing the acute and apparently irreconcilable crisis. It is the fundamental difference in ideas between the two sides. President Roosevelt says, 'We are going to win the war and we are going to win the peace that follows.' Odd Fellows believe that the world will be true without the slightest reservation, and that Mr. Churchill in every utterance concerning the entire topic steadily maintains that Christian principles must be the foundation of the new order. As Odd Fellows again we can easily affirm this part of the order before us.

"It is a matter of regret to all civilization as well as members of the Order that the conditions have reached the status they are in today. Many of our jurisdictions have been eliminated today at the command of the Dictator. All the countries in which Odd Fellowship is permitted to function are engaged in a death struggle to preserve democracy. Savagery and a broken peace and the evil efforts of jealousy, greed, and frustrations impel those who are chief supporters of arms to acquire by any means possible means to dominate. The rule that follows such conquest leaves a great deal of concern in the minds of those who have undertaken the defence of freedom and justice.

"Odd Fellows, pledged to the belief of a supreme being, to be faithful to his country and fraternal to his brother man, are vitally interested in the outcome of the present struggle for the reason that everything upon which Odd Fellowship is founded is well as the very essentials of fraternity are challenged today. It would indeed be a serious day for our order and the fraternity if democracy were to fail. Its failure would destroy the fruits of the best efforts of the best years of the lives of our members who in their time devoted so much to the building up of a fraternity that would be a lasting temple in the hearts of the members.

"Brotherhood of Man. "Odd Fellowship must stand for the brotherhood of man or it has no place among the societies. If we lose our fight for democracy and its subsequent pillars of freedom and justice we will be compelled to realize the destructive effect this loss will have on the fraternal structure we have so persistently and patiently reared on our own uniform, such as the same as an army officer's but with rank indicated by bands on the sleeve as in the R. C. A. F.—Ottawa Journal.

You should consider this, on account of the present shortage of labor and the possibility of conditions being even worse this fall.

We handle the following brands of Fertilizer at the same f.o.b. cash price as any other dealer at any station in Prince Edward Island: Island Fertilizer, International Fertilizer, and Colonial Fertilizer, in both paper and jute bags.

We will charge truckage this year on Fertilizer; but, if you have a return load of Potatoes or Turnips to come in, when your Fertilizer is being delivered, we will not charge you truckage for bringing back your produce.

VERY IMPORTANT: Last year, we were entirely too easy in our methods of securing settlement of the Fertilizer before settlement had been made. This year, it will be necessary for all settlements for Fertilizer to be in before we will make deliveries.
