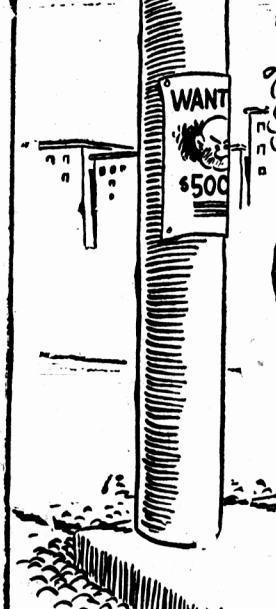

Youthful Redhead Is Top Executive For Jet Company

NEW YORK, July 19—(CP)—"Cynthia Holloway, General Manager," is the imposing title on the door. If you walked into her office in London you would find a vivacious 27-year-old redhead seated behind the desk.

She is general manager of Power Jets, a British concern responsible for many war-time developments in jet-propulsion and gas-turbine engines.

"I was rather a dunce at mathematics and science in school and yet here I am with a job like this," she laughs.

The "job like this" is one that requires her to travel all over the world, acting as liaison officer for her company, talking with engineers and urging co-operation between British and other countries developing gas-turbine engines. She was interviewed the other day in New York.

The secret of her rapid climb to success?

"I was lucky," she confesses. "My employer was in the Air Force and I had been in the W.A.A.F., so that gave us something in common. He was very helpful—just a plain telling me what to do, he'd explain how it should be done and why."

Rapid Promotion

After her discharge from the Air Force, Mrs. Holloway got a job with Power Jets as secretary. Being a young company with lots of room for advancement for those with ambition, it promoted her rapidly.

Mrs. Holloway manages to combine successfully her career with her home-making. Her husband, a water-transport engineer, helps with the cooking, marketing and housekeeping in their apartment in Chelsea.

"He's really a better cook than I am," she acknowledges, "although I'm better at making soup."

She is amused at people's reaction in the United States when they find the general manager of Power Jets is a personable young woman.

"They expect to find a portly gentleman along the line of Colonel Blimp, I guess," she smiles. "But men in England aren't surprised—they got used to working with women in all sorts of jobs during the war."

Mrs. Holloway finds her job too intensive to permit hobbies. "But I did make this hat—the frame came from Paris and I sewed the ribbon on it." The hat was made entirely of lavender ribbons and she wore a pale lavender dress to match.

"I'm afraid I'm just not the domestic type—I love my work too much," she said in mock sorrow.

CALLS ON ARTISANS TO HELP ST. PAUL'S

LONDON, July 19—(Reuters)—An appeal to artists, musicians, scholars and architects to help enrich Saint Paul's Cathedral was made in a sermon by Canon L. J. Collins, preaching in the cathedral.

The canon described the cathedral as being "like a piece of Victorian furniture" and declared that it has ceased to share in the life of the people.

"Why is the cathedral no longer a dynamic inspiration as it was in wartime?" demanded Canon Collins. "Saint Paul's like the rest of the church, if it is to live today, must share in the peacetime life of the people."

The best way life could be given to the cathedral was for artists and artificers of all kinds to offer their best to enrich and beautify it, said Canon Collins.

"Let them vie with each other to offer their gifts and so enable the best of modern art and mod-

ern craftsmanship to find expression to the glory of God."

BOER WAR NURSES TO BE REUNIONED

LONDON, July 19—(CP)—The band on the dock played "Good-bye Dolly Gray" and 32 excited nurses were off to South Africa and the battlefields of the Boer War.

That was July, 1899.

Fifty years after, Sarah Alice Claridge, one of the 32, is organizing a reunion of the survivors.

Miss Claridge is 78 now, but almost a toddler among some of the one-time nursing sisters who have accepted invitations to the reunion.

The oldest is 91. Some will come in wheel chairs, others on crutches. St. John Ambulance nurses will take care of them.
