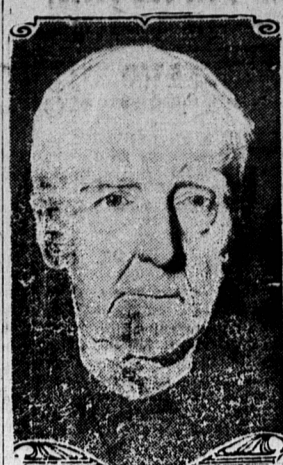

MR. JOHN McMILLAN

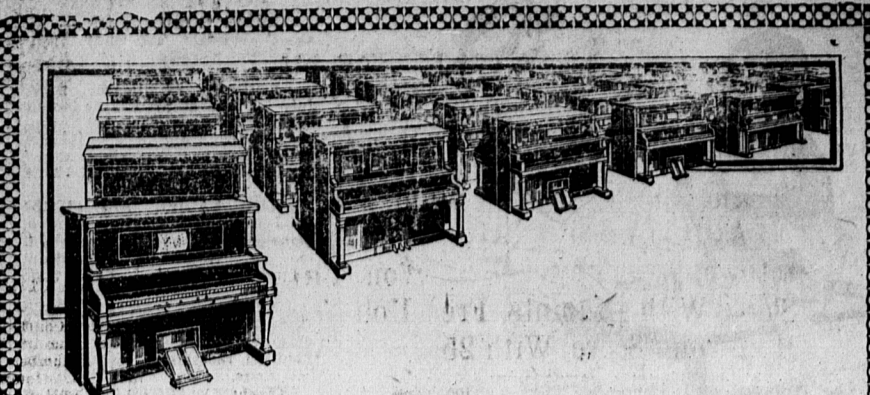
