THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Mar. 4.—The receipts of butter today were 1050 pkgs as compared with 51 for the same day last week and 18 for the corresponding day a year ago. There was no actual change in the condition of the market today, the undertone being steady with a fair demand for small lots from both local and outside buyers to meet immediate wants and sales of finest township creamery were made at 53 1-2c to 54c per pound; finest re-graded western creamery at 52c to 53c and the lower grades at 50c to 51c. The trade in a wholesale jobbing way is reported steady and prices are unchanged with sales of finest creamery at 55c per pound in solid packages and at 55c per pound in 1-lb. blocks. The receipt of cheese today were 25 boxes as against one for the same day last week and 24 for the corresponding day a year ago. The market is without any new feature to note, the feeling being very firm on account of the limited supply available on spot and the good enquiry for the same for home consumption and sales of colored goods were made at 29 1-2c to 30c per pound and white at 29 1-2 to 29 3-4.
