DIED OR FROZEN EGGS TO SOLVE HIGH PRICE.

WASHINGTON, December 12.—Dr. Mary E. Pennington, in charge of food research work of the department of agriculture, told the house agriculture committee today that frozen and dried eggs would solve the problem of high prices and cold storage corners.

"Frozen and dried eggs," said Dr. Pennington, "soon will be marketed in small packages, so as to be available to every household, instead of for bakers and other manufacturers as at present. Hard frozen eggs will keep a year and there is no question that dried and frozen egg will ultimately displace the cold storage variety."

Eggs cannot be kept in cold storage and be fit for food longer than ten months, she asserted, and added that dried and frozen eggs do not lose any of their nutritive value.

WOODROW WILSON EAR A MONOCLE.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—President Wilson wears a monocle. It is just the same as the "awells" in Fleet street wear, but the manner and the time in which the president wears it, recommend him to consider it. He does not dress any snappier than he ever did, and he still talks Washington English. The monocle is worn only when he is reading. The President has never worn the monocle in the street, and as far as is known, never makes use of it except when at the desk, looking over papers. He, however, has set a precedent for monocle wearing by the presidents of the United States.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—The possibility of building a large passenger liner that would not under any of the unknown mishaps of sea lose her buoyancy or stability and sink were discussed here last night at the general meeting of the society of architects and marine engineers. Geo. W. Dickie, vice president of the society, brought up the subject of the unsinkable ship in an address. He said: "In brief, the suggestions embodied are the fitting of a double water deck and so arranging the lower tight subdivisions below the lower member of this deck, that the ship would prove both sea worthy and unsinkable under the most aggravating conditions of floating."
