CANADA'S SURPLUS NEARLY \$22,000,000

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—The financial statement of Canada for the first ten months of the fiscal year shows an increase of revenue for the ten months of \$12,572,886, and an increase in January alone of \$1,481,388. For the month the total revenue was \$8,120,441, and for ten months, \$81,510,522.

ASQUITH AND GREY MAY BOTH GO OUT

LONDON, Feb. 6.—It is freely stated in political circles that neither Sir Asquith, the Prime Minister, nor Sir Edward Grey, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, will accept office under a new government. It is further stated that Earl Crewe will become Viceroy of India in succession to Earl Minto, and that Lord Carrington will be appointed Governor General of Canada.

ONTARIO WOMEN WANT TO VOTE

SHORTAGE IS LIKELY TO REACH \$500,000

WORCESTER, Feb. 6.—The feeling is steadily growing in Southbridge that the defalcation in the Southbridge Savings Bank will reach \$500,000. President Calvin D. Paige, admits that the guaranty fund of \$122,000, the profit and loss account of \$54,000 and the \$20,000 due the bank from the bonding company, which took John A. Hall's bond as treasurer of the bank, is wiped out, and the trustees say that the shortage is already over \$300,000.
