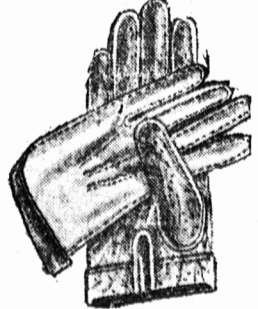

And to us the news brought regrets, as it ever does and a great pity for those married folks who have failed to find their spell of Eden here below. "Well, well!" James smiled, looking up from the card "do you know Ellen?" "You can't believe the half you hear!" we grinned. If as Aunt Kitty Mahoney used to have it: "Where there's smoke, there's fire!" it must have all cleared away, and differences forgotten in the magic of this Christmas season, for there was proof of it, remembering others of her words: "As big as life and twice as natural!" in the signatures which were no ways aloof but seemed rather to intertwine "From Tom and Anne."
