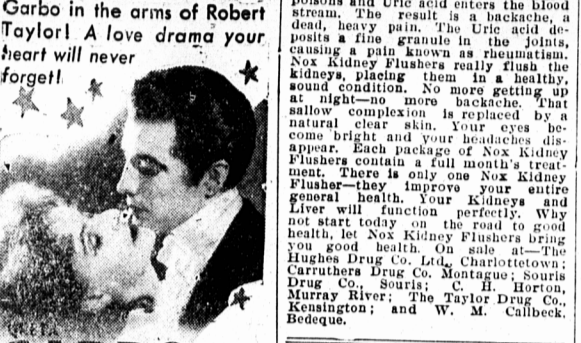

ships of Admiral Hasegawa's fleet, went into immediate operation against all Chinese shipping. Foreign vessels were specifically exempted.
Although no state of war has been declared between China and Japan, the theatre now affected has been spread down almost the entire Chinese map.
The southern direct effects of the struggle until now, became a zone of conflict because of the Japanese naval patrol extending through the straits between Formosa and the south China mainland.
The blockade paralyzed Chinese shipping, but neutral observers believed its purpose primarily was to retaliate for destruction of Japanese property by Chinese shells and warplanes.
Eye-witnesses of the landing of Japanese forces to strengthen their foothold in Central China said the invaders already had begun moving in on Shanghai from landing places at Luho and other points on the Yangtze as well as at the Wosung forts, further inland toward the embattled city.
Identical movements, it was believed, were being carried out on the coast, east of Shanghai and south of the Yangtze estuary, bringing a column up from the rear to strike behind Pootung, rich industrial section across the Whangpoo River from the heart of Shanghai.
The numbers of newly landed forces were not known, but were believed to be considerable.
It became evident, also, that the defence lines in Chapei, Kiangwan and other frontiers ringing the International Settlement of Shanghai were feeling the increased Japanese pressure.
Although there was no cessation of the hostilities that have rung in the ears of the city's millions for

Santander, "city of perpetual spring," today gave insurgent General Franco almost complete control of the entire northwestern half of Spain. It will release the legions which have been besieging Biscayan ports for a concerted drive against Madrid.
Revolts of insurgent sympathizers within the city and a smashing drive by six insurgent columns brought Santander's downfall, insurgents reported. Food was scarce. Insurgent ships blockaded entry of supplies by sea, and insurgent troops throttled highways over which reinforcements might have come.
A hundred thousand insurgent troops, including the Italian Black Arrow brigade, swarmed over the

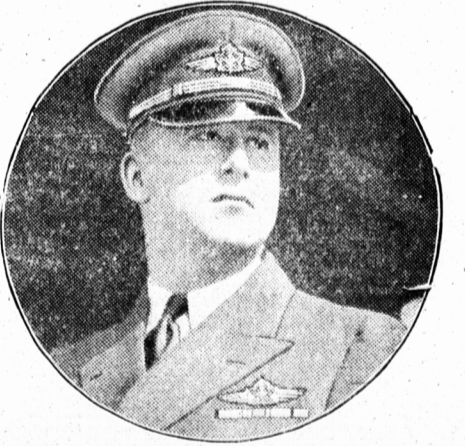
