THE AGED POOR.

One of the most delicate and difficult problems which philanthropic people have to solve is a proper means of giving help to aged people. The objection to giving financial aid to any class of persons cannot obtain with those who are absolutely unable to do anything for their own support. In all work bureaus the applications from persons who are not able to compete with other laborers in health, strength or training are constantly a subject of serious conference and tender consideration. They ask for work, but they are unable to do it. They really intend to work, but they can not recognize that their feebleness and incompetency makes it impossible for them to be employed. How to do something for them without injuring their self-respect and making them a demoralizing example is a question which has not, up to the present time, been successfully met.

The Boston Herald in speaking of the matter says: Mrs. James T. Fields, for a long time a vice-president in the Associated Charities, and, of course, practicing and preaching its principles—all against degrading the poor by giving them any other help than moral, educational and befriending—makes a very touching ap-

peal in behalf of the worthy old people who must be cared for either privately or in the almshouses. She proposes to start a memorial fund and asks that contributions for it be sent to her. This is surely a wise and benevolent plan, and ought to stimulate the generosity of all who believe in surrounding old age with evidences of respect and affection. It is surely time that some means of adding to the comfort of such old people who have outlived their power of doing for themselves and outlived, too, all their relatives and friends, who might properly be expected to assume their charge, should be provided.

LIBERAL CONVENTION YESTERDAY

A Large Attendance and Representative Meeting

A CANDIDATE IS SELECTED

Nathaniel McLaren of Montague the Choice of Delegates—His Selection Made Unanimous.

The Liberal Convention of the Third District of King's County was held yesterday afternoon at Charlottetown to nominate a Liberal Candidate to contest the seat formerly held by the late Capt. Malcolm McDonald, Georgetown.

The attendance at the Convention was large, every poll in the District being represented or having reported.

Duncan McLaren of Cardigan, was the chairman.

After speeches by a number of gentlemen, J. F. Norton of Cardigan, and Nathaniel McLaren, Montague, were put in nomination. Upon a vote being taken the latter obtained the majority of votes and the choice was afterwards made unanimous by the Convention.

After cheers and further speech-making the meeting broke up.

The Liberal-Conservatives will select their representative next Saturday.
