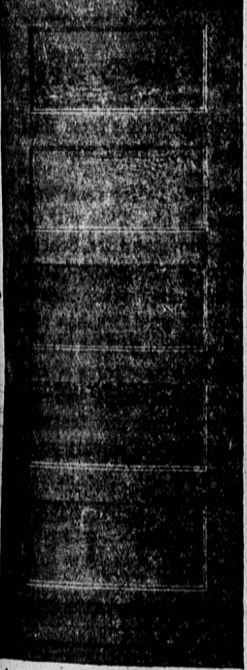

SCOUT NEWS FROM BEDEQUE

On July 29 the 1st Bedeque Freetown Troop Boy Scout went into camp for ten days at Fernwood, P. E. I. under the leadership of Rev. A. G. Crowe, S. M. with Mr. J. B. Lewis as assistant.

A regular program of Scouting activities including swimming and life-saving instructions, signalling, knot tying, splicing and lashing, cooking, tracking and observation; gadgets and first aid was carried out and resulted in various accomplishments on the part of the boys—several passing their second class tests while many boys passed different tests. Each day was brought to a happy close with the council fire which held a very large place in the camp life. The P. L. of the Duty Patrol each day arranged a program for the occasion and some very fine times around the council fire resulted.

During the stay in camp, a special patrol competition—based on general inspection, special inspection, tents, grounds, latrines, pits, gadgets, kitchen and observation—was opened. The various patrols entered into the competition with great interest and enthusiasm and the much coveted reward—the Troop Flag—was won three times by the Foxes three times by the Beavers, and twice by the Otters while the greatest total number of credit went to the Otters.

On Sunday, August 2, the Troop attended divine service at the Bedeque Baptist Church at 10.45 a. m. During the afternoon an open air service was held on the Camp Grounds when large numbers of relatives and friends of the Scouts attended. Rev. 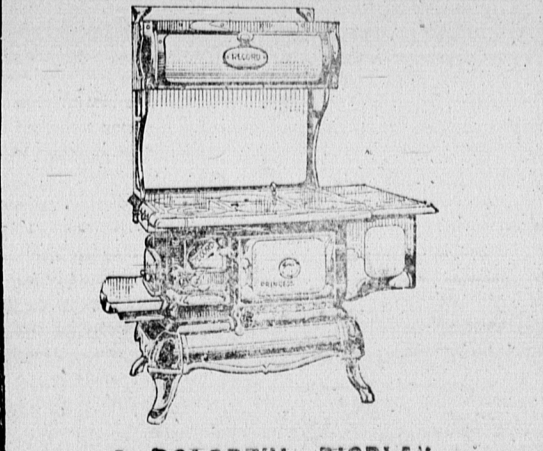
