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P. E. ISLAND MARKSMEN AGAIN VICTORIOUS

They Succeeded In Carrying Off The Trophy At The Inter-Provincial Contest With The High Aggregate Of 779 Points, 16 Points Higher Than Last Year's Score. --New Brunswick Team Came Second And Nova Scotia Third.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 14.—Prince Edward Island marksmen were again this year successful in carrying off the trophy for the inter-provincial rifle match with an aggregate of 779 points, sixteen points better than the score with which they won the trophy last year.

Twenty Looters Were Executed

TIENTSIN, China, June 14.—Twenty looters were executed in Tientsin yesterday on orders of Gen. Fu Tso-Yi, Shansi commander, who is in charge of the city. Following a night of firing around the city, mostly by retiring northern troops, who shot into the air, disturbances occurred in the western suburbs. Gunmen in plain clothes, believed to be former northerners, were active and looting broke out in certain districts. Fighting between the gunmen and the police took place in various districts with numerous casualties.

Verdict Of Jury In Mallet Case

The Supreme Court at Summerside was occupied all day yesterday with a continuation of the case of the King vs. Frank Mallett charged with the theft of fox pups from the ranch of John Sims, French River. The afternoon session of the court in which the acting Attorney General was not in attendance continued until after six o'clock. The jury then retired and at eight p. m. returned with a verdict of "not guilty."

Wilkins Knighted By King George

Island Delegates Return Home

Every Province In Canada Represented At The Annual Convention of the Canadian Legion Held in Saint John, N. B.

- The Island delegates to the 2nd Annual Convention returned home last night from St. John, N. B., by the late train.
- Every Province of Canada was represented on the floor of the convention, while at the meetings of the Women's Auxiliary the Island was the only Province not represented.
- General Sir Percy Lake presided at the meetings and on his retiring from the office of President he was presented with a beautiful silver tea service.
- General Sir Arthur Currie was elected President for the coming year. In addition to important resolutions on the question of immigration, some forty official resolutions were passed as presented by the resolutions committee, the first resolution reading: "King and Country, I am a loyal subject."
- Other resolutions referred to such matters as pensions, soldiers problems, objects and aims of the Legion, etc.
- One resolution dealt with the unfortunate Andrew Fraser Mitchell in which it was ordered that this matter be given the attention of the Dominion Command of the Legion. This matter was also dealt with in the address of Sir Percy Lake.
- One hundred and forty eight accredited delegates were present and also a large number of fraternal delegates and twenty lady delegates to the Ladies Auxiliary.
- Dr. King, Minister of Soldiers Re-establishment was present and testified to the great work being done for the returned soldiers by the Canadian Legion. The very fact that the Dominion Government has given a grant of \$10,000,000 to the Legion for work in its Service Bureau is evidence of the faith placed in the Legion by the Government.
- The aim of the Legion is for the present not to press for additional relief in the matter of pensions, but to work in the interests of the returned man who is not pensioned but who, owing to being overaged or otherwise physically broken is not able to compete successfully in the Labour market. This is the immediate problem confronting the Legion.
- A banquet was held in the Admiralty Hall Tuesday night.
- Among those in seats of honour were His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, Sir Percy Lake, Hon. Dr. Veniot, Postmaster General, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Chief Justice of N. B., Hon. Dr. King, Minister of Pensions and Health, Sir Richard Turner, V. C., Hon. Mr. Tilley, representing the Premier of N. B., His Worship, the Mayor of St. John, all of whom delivered addresses.
- Comrade T. E. MacNutt of Charlottetown proposed the toast to the City of St. John, which was responded to by His Worship the Mayor and Alderman Ralph McInerney.
- On Thursday the Ladies Auxiliary presented to the Convention resolutions on the important subjects of immigration, Poppy Day, Homes for Soldiers and a Battlefields Pilgrimage.
- They also decided for the present that no Dominion Command be formed but recommended that Provincial commands be formed at once, as a step towards a Dominion command.
- The Island delegates in attendance were Comrades H. D. Johnson, Phillip E. Palmer, Arthur G. Bruce, T. E. MacNutt, of Charlottetown and Comrade E. B. Ellis of the O'Leary Branch.
- On Wednesday night in the Imperial Theatre a private showing of the Picture Dawn showing the work and death of Nurse Cavell took place for the Convention.

CITY COUNCIL ACCEPT NEW LIGHT AND POWER RATE

Resolution Passed At Meeting Last Night Accepting Report Of Light Committee, And Calling For Contract With The Company For The New Rates. -- Other Resolutions Passed Re Circus In Park And Plank For Curbs.

A special meeting of the City Council to consider the report of the Light Committee was held last night. His Worship Mayor Yeo presided, and Councillors Prowse, Kennedy, Reardon, Holman, Foster and MacLeod were present; also the Acting City Recorder and the Chief of Police.

Before considering the question of a new electric rates contract, the Council took up the request of the Canadian Legion for the use of a part of the park for the purpose of holding a carnival from June 27th to July 7th.

Councillor Foster felt that since these people have had this privilege in the past it be extended to this year also.

His Worship pointed out that during the dates mentioned the militia were in camp. Care must be taken that this carnival did not conflict with the camp.

Councillor MacLeod submitted a resolution that the Canadian Legion be accorded this privilege, providing that the militia were not thereby interfered with.

This was seconded by Councillor Foster and carried.

A resolution was submitted empowering the city engineer to place plank along the curb or to cut the curb down in accordance with the new traffic by law which permits parking outside the curb in certain places.

His Worship was of the opinion that plank should be used, rather than that the curb be cut down.

Councillor Holman for the police committee, said he was perfectly willing that plank should be used and the curb allowed to remain intact.

The resolution was amended so as to permit of plank being placed

Death Of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst

LONDON, June 14.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, prominent British suffrage leader and mother of Sylvia Pankhurst, died today at the West End Nursing Home where she had been ill for several months.

Mrs. Pankhurst, widow of the late Richard Marsden Pankhurst, had long been active in suffragist circles throughout Great Britain. She served on various public reform groups but dropped all of this work to devote her life to obtaining votes for women.

During the war she left everything to aid in national service and made many recruiting speeches. Two of her daughters, Christabel and Sylvia, followed actively in her suffragist movements. She had published many articles, the most important of which was "My Own Story" which came out in 1914. Mrs. Pankhurst was in the 70th year of her age.

Six Candidates For Vice-President

CONVENTION HALL, Kansas City, Mo., June 14.—Republican party leaders have narrowed the vice presidential fight down to six candidates, three from the middle west and three from the east. They will confer tonight and reach a decision which they will attempt to put through the convention tomorrow.

The six candidates in the field now are: from the middle west Hanford MacNeider of Iowa; Senator Deneen of Illinois and Senator Curtis of Kansas.

From the east—representative Tilson of Connecticut; Senator Moses of New Hampshire and Senator Edge of New Jersey. Vice President Dawes has been virtually eliminated as the Hoover forces did not want him, it was authoritatively reported.

DENIES CANADA HAS EQUALITY OF STATUS

Hon. R. B. Bennett Is Also Opposed to the Appointment of Ministers From Canada to Foreign Countries—Leader Gets Big Ovation at Liberal-Conservative Business Men's Banquet.

TORONTO, June 14.—Hon. R. B. Bennett received a great ovation from his followers when he was the guest of the Liberal-Conservative Business Men's Club at the King Edward Hotel today. About 1,000 guests were present who rose and cheered as the leader entered accompanied by the President of the Club, R. C. Matthews.

Among those at the head table were Mayor McBride, Hon. W. H. Price, Hon. George S. Henry, acting Premier Sir Edward Kemp, Right Hon. Arthur Meighan, Sir Thomas White, Sir Joseph Flavelle, Hon. Charles McCrea, John R. MacNicol, William Croft, Presidents of Ward Associations and others.

The burden of Mr. Bennett's speech was an attack on the government expenditures. "No country with a population of nine and a half million people can stand it long," he declared. Diversity of occupation he said, was what was required to maintain Canada's policy.

Mr. Bennett also opposed the appointment of ministers from Canada to foreign countries which he said would militate against solidarity of action. When it came to diplomatic questions, matters of peace and war, the members of the empire should speak with a single voice. He denied that Canada had equality of status in the empire.

Mr. Matthews, introducing Mr. Bennett, said that in the house of commons he was the most popular man. "At times he is not quite so popular with Mr. King and members of his party," said Mr. Matthews. Before he became leader of the opposition, he had taken a high place in Canadian industrial life. He had a wide knowledge of Canada and of parliamentary affairs.

It was not hard to predict that his statesmanship would be equally as brilliant as his professional career. He would always be found in loyal sympathy with the Motherland. Mr. Bennett's speech was broadcast by C. P. C. A. Toronto Daily Star.

While Mr. Matthews entered into his eulogy, Mr. Bennett blushed becomingly and uttered disparaging remarks to Attorney Gen. Price, his right hand neighbor.

"I assure you that I arise with some difficulty to address this gathering," said Mr. Bennett as he rose after Mr. Matthews' short talk. He referred briefly to the guests who were present, with particularly pointed remarks on his old chief, Arthur Meighan and Sir Joseph Flavelle, both of whom were seated at the head table.

Continuing he said that "my new position as leader of the opposition in the House of Commons is no easy task."

Presbyterians Reach An Amicable Settlement

REGINA, Sask., June 14.—After deliberating for a week on the activities of the church at home and abroad, the 54th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was brought to a close tonight. The 1928 session will be held at Ottawa early next June.

The final day was productive of orderly progress, although a number of overtures submitted by the various presbyteries were tabled or referred to central boards for study and further report.

REGINA, Sask., June 14.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada this afternoon reached an amicable settlement of the contentious issue regarding the re-organization of their church government.

According to a speech by Rev. Dr. R. G. MacBeth Vancouver, convenor of the Special Compromise Committee of 29 ministers and laymen, the Presbyterian Church in Canada is not going to divide on any issue when conference between the several boards would always result in an understanding.

Cyclone Causes Death Of Six

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 14.—A cyclone broke over New South Wales today, causing damage estimated at hundreds of thousands of dollars. Six persons were reported dead in early reports. The windstorm struck the suburbs of Sydney, causing considerable damage. The steamer Whitebay was reported wrecked at Stockton.
