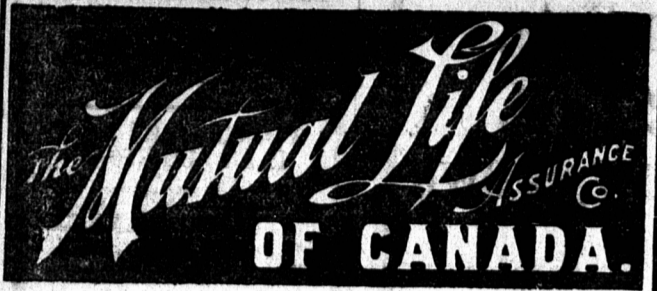


Prosperity and Progress

Some Splendid Jumping in Cryst. Rink Last Night.

A fair number of spectators witnessed some high class performances on skates in Crystal Rink last evening when W. E. Quinn, the world championship jumper gave an exhibition of most cleverly executed jumping which made genuine entertainment and elicited much applause.

Mr. Quinn gave a splendid exhibition of high jumping, broad jumping, jumping over from one to six barrels placed together, over hurdles, turning hand springs, and jumping into a barrel and out again. The perfect ease with which the performer went through these most difficult feats was marvellous and the best ever seen here.

Mr. Quinn is a native of Freehold, New Jersey and is Physical Director of the West Side Athletic Club, New York. He holds the world's professional record on skates in running high jump, 4 ft 10 1/2 in made in Brooklyn, N. Y.; standing high jump 4ft 11 in made in Pittsburg, Mass, standing broad jump 9 ft 4 1/2 in; running broad jump 23 ft 3/4 in and hurdle race 22 1/2 yds. 21 1/2 seconds made at Redbank, N. J.
