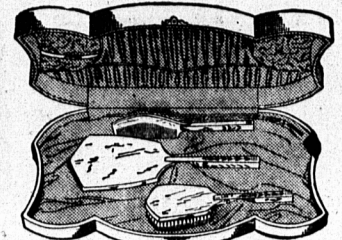

**EXPRESS MATTER BY TRANS-CANADA AIR**  
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 1—Canada National air express will be extended to North Bay and Kapuskasing, Ontario today (December 1) according to announcement made here yesterday. Using the twin-motored planes of the Trans-Canada Air Lines the Canadian National Express now sends intermediate points as Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina and Lethbridge. Shipments are also carried between Lethbridge and Edmonton and by arrangement with prairie airways air express service was extended yesterday between Regina and Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, Prince Albert and North Battleford, Sask.  
Starting today, Trans Canada planes carrying experimental air mail will leave Montreal at 9:15 A. M. Ottawa at 10:23, Toronto at 12:15 reaching North Bay at 1:30, leaving there at 1:45 arriving at Kapuskasing at 3:35 and leaving 10 minutes later to arrive at Winnipeg at 7:23 P. M. Taking off from Winnipeg at 11:30 P. M. they will be in Vancouver at 5:20 the following morning. Eastbound, the planes will depart from Vancouver at 7:15 P. M., reaching Winnipeg at 5:18 A. M. and leaving at 5:45. Arrival time at Kapuskasing is 10:20 A. M. with departure at 10:30 fifteen minutes will be spent at Northbay, which is reached at noon. Arrival at Toronto is at 1:30, at Ottawa 3:10 and at Montreal 4:20 P. M.
