**LITTLE DAUGHTER DEAD.**—Deepest sympathy will be extended to Mr. and Mrs. Chester M. Cox in the death of their little daughter Miriam, which occurred yesterday morning after a brief illness. Mr. Cox's four little children have been ill for some days with the prevailing whooping cough and measles and the death of this bright little tot has been a severe trial to the parents.

**CAR-FERRY STEAMER.**—The "Prince Edward" docked in Charlottetown yesterday morning at 10.35. She brought a full cargo of merchandise, some four hundred tons in all, and her arrival the steamer immediately started to "blow off" two of her boilers in order to have them cleaned. She will thus be under the power of four boilers for the present instead of six while this is being done and consequently her speed for the time being will be considerably reduced.
