PHOTOGRAPHY REVOLUTIONIZED

BY NEW INVENTION

Films, Plates and Dark Room Made Unnecessary.

New Camera Takes Finished Pictures In Two Minutes

Mr. Edmond F. Stratton, of New York City, has invented a camera that takes and completes pictures ready to see in two minutes. It does away with the expense of buying films or plates and the trouble, expense and delay of having them developed and pictures printed by a photographer. The camera has a fixed focus lens and there is no delicate focusing mechanism to get out of order or for you to learn to operate.

This camera, which is called the Gordon Camera, is being manufactured by the Gordon Camera Company, of New York. As they are desirous of making it known in every locality, they are making a special offer to our readers. For a limited time upon receipt of \$2.50 (and 50 cents additional to cover express charges, sensitized cards and developing powder) they will send you a regular \$5 Model A Gordon Camera.

The sensitized cards, which make pictures 2 1/2 x 3 1/2 inches, are wrapped for daylight loading, and the powders make the developing solution to be put into the developing tank, which is inside the camera. The camera itself is 5 1/2 x 9 inches and weighs 2 pounds 4 ounces.

The cost of taking pictures with the Gordon camera is almost nothing in comparison to all other cameras. Extra sensitized cards can be bought for 1 1/2 cents each, and 10 cents worth of developer will develop over 40 pictures. The Gordon Company sells flash light lamps for 80 cents, which will enable you to take pictures at night in your own parlor, or out of doors.

The operation of this new camera is so simple that any little boy or girl can easily take good pictures with it after reading the directions sent with each one. There is no customs duty to be paid as the Gordon Company will ship to you from their Canadian factory which is near Toronto. WEATHER FORECASTS FOR MAY 1913

With a Regular Storm Period central on the 4th, and extending from the 2nd to the 7th, expect all the results due under such astronomical conditions. The Moon is on the celestial equator on the 2nd, and in conjunction with Earth and Sun on the 6th. It will grow suddenly very warm on and about the 2nd, the barometer will fall to low readings, and a series of threatening thunder storms will set in, passing from west to east over the country. The 4th, 5th and 6th will be the dates of greatest storm culminations, although the 2nd calls for active lightning and thunder. Change to clearing and cooler weather will follow in the immediate wake of the storms, spreading eastward for several days. From about the 2nd to the 9th is a seismic period, calling for a return of earthquake shocks in various parts of the globe. The 6th is the central day of the Period. A Reactionary Storm Period is central on the 9th, 10th and 11th. The Mercury equinoctial period begins in this reactionary period, and its added influence will be noticeable in thick, prolonged cloudiness, with tendency to drizzle and rain. But for the fact that solar conditions are annually intensified, in all the central states, in the month of May, the causes of the heavy storms are at a minimum at this time. But it is always wise to watch storm developments in May, especially when we are passing through, and are near the center of a Jupiter period. Very cool nights with probable frosts northward, will come with the high barometric area behind these storms.

A Regular Storm Period, and the Mercury period both have their centers on the 16th. While the effects of the Mercury disturbance will be apparent from about the 9th to the 20th, it will be felt in greatest power during the storm periods within the Mercury brace. This will be especially true on and about the 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th. The Moon being in perigee and on the celestial equator on the 15th, electrical and wind storms of great energy are apt to appear on and touching that date. No intelligent person who has ever proven the worth of a good barometer, especially at such times as this, would be without one for any consideration. Every person must settle this question for himself. If any one concludes that all this we are saying about the barometer is to induce others to purchase our Word and Works Barometer, he is defrauding himself, his business and his family out of the most important advice we can possibly give. If in your estimation we are little and selfish in all this, get you a barometer elsewhere—anywhere, so you get a good one and use it wisely and well.

A Reactionary Storm Period involves the 21st, 22nd and 23rd. Or and touching these days all the meteorological elements will undergo a periodic change—temperature will rise, barometer will fall, cloudiness will ensue, and renewed storms of more or less rain, wind and thunder will make their transit eastwardly across the country. The center of an

other seismic period falls on the 26th, calling for renewed earthquake disturbances between the 17th and the 23rd. Very cool nights for so late in the season will result from the high barometer, and other anti-storm conditions, about the 23rd to 26th.

A Regular Storm Period covers the last week in May, being central on the 27th. The Moon is at last quarter on the 27th, in apogee on the 28th, and on the celestial equator on the 29th. There is a suspicion that there is a fixed tendency to severe and dangerous storms on and about May 27th. This we will not affirm or deny. At all events, we may expect regular storms of rain, thunder and wind to attend the low barometer and change to much warmer which are certain to appear from about the 26th to the 29th. The great tornado which devastated a large strip of St. Louis in 1896 occurred on May the 27th, and it is a fact that thousands of people who witnessed that awful visitation look with apprehension and dread upon the return of each anniversary of that fatal day. It does not necessarily follow that tornadoes, or other dangerous storms must return to the same localities or towns on such anniversaries; but as we have often explained in this Almanac, in our magazine, Word and Works, and in public lectures, the month of May, as a rule, brings a maximum crisis in severe, tornado storms, and all threatening storm clouds should be watched with apprehension.

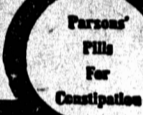
