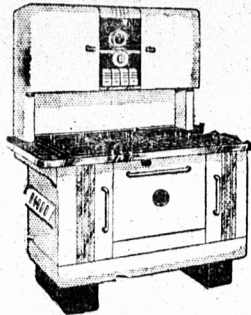

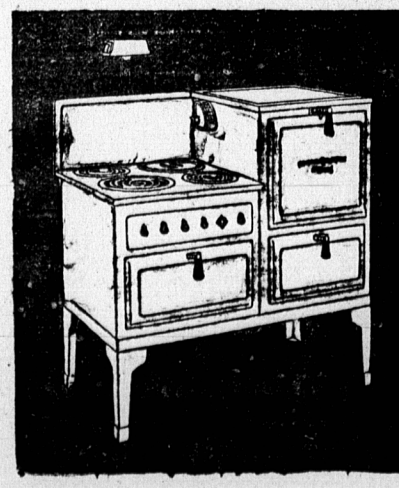

COPPER KETTLES
To clean copper kettles, rub with a lemon cut in half and dipped in salt. This will remove tarnish marks and make the metal bright.

Hair-brushes should be washed in hot water to which a nut of soda or a few drops of ammonia have been added. Dip the bristles in and out, but do not allow the water to cover the backs. Rinse in cold water and wipe the backs but not the bristles.
