**THE QUEEN LISTENS-IN**

LEONON, March 23—(By The Canadian Press)—A new four-value portable wireless set was delivered at Buckingham Palace for March 5, so that the Queen could hear the broadcast relay from "White Horse Inn" at the Coliseum. The Queen had already seen the show twice, but when it became known that the British Broadcasting Corporation were to broadcast a part of it, arrangements were made for a portable wireless to be sent to the Palace.

The piano which interested the Duke of York on his recent visit to the British Industries Fair at Olympia, is one of the biggest in the world, and forms part of a consignment of 29 pianos ordered by the B. B. C. It is called the Super-Grand, 9 feet, 6 inches long, designed after months of experiment with special models for use in wireless studios.

**STREAM FLOW IN THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC**

The Dominion Water Power and Hydrometric Bureau of the Department of the Interior reports that the run-off of the streams in the province of Quebec during December was above normal except in the area south of the St. Lawrence River. In the northern portion of the province stream flow records indicate a run-off seventy per cent greater than the December average, whilst for the area draining to the St. Lawrence from the north the run-off was about five per cent above the normal. South of the St. Lawrence in the Sherbrooke area the run-off was only about seventy per cent of the December average, whilst further east near the mouth of the St. Lawrence the run-off was less than seventy per cent of normal.

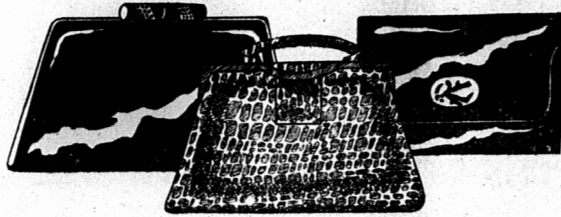

## Mrs. H. Ferguson Christens Oil Tanker

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, England, March 27. (Canadian Press Cable)—"Lakeshell" largest oil tanker ever built in Great Britain for the Canadian trade last night floated at her moorings in this harbor.

The ship which has a carrying capacity of 600,000 gallons, was launched yesterday when Mrs. G. Howard Ferguson, wife of the Canadian High Commissioner in London performed the christening ceremony. The launching was at-

tended also by W. C. Noxon, agent general for Ontario at London, and F. P. Burden, agent general for British Columbia. "Lakeshell" was built to the order of Dominion Tankers, Limited, and will be the largest tanker afloat on the Great Lakes when she is put into commission in Canada.
