OUR LONDON LETTER

of the new Union and was addressed by several ladies representing Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Canada. Miss Margaret Hodge, fresh from an extended tour which concluded in Canada, told her audience that adverse criticisms of the movement overseas was all due to two causes, the first being press misrepresentation, and the second, ignorance of conditions in the old Country. The newspaperman is accustomed to Suffragette lashing, but one is inclined to wonder how it is that he is not shown up by the thousands of unprejudiced visitors who travel to and fro between Great Britain and the Dominions. Does the average tourist go back and announce that the cables sent over are worthy of Ananias?

There was also some criticism of the Imperial Naturalization Bill on account of the provision whereby a married woman assumes the nationality of her husband. Incidentally the arguments against the bill brought out the fact that a woman was better off under the British flag than any other.

Mrs. Fawcett in sending greeting from the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies stated that although representatives might on this occasion find themselves on the same platform as representatives of military bodies, the National Union wished it to be understood that this did not imply any co-operation with militancy in this country or elsewhere.

Canadian athletes did not succeed this year in carrying off any trophies in the Henley regatta, though in the earlier stages they showed to good account. For the Grand Challenge Cup the Winnipeg crew beat the Thames by a length and a half, but finally fell before Harvard. Bible of Toronto turned down competitors for the Diamond Sculls but was rowed out by the Italian, Sinigaglia. How sorely some Englishmen have taken to heart the victories of foreigners in the two principal events may be judged by an advertisement which appeared in the "Agony" column of the "Times" on Tuesday last, thus:—

"In loving memory of this Henley on Saturday, July 4th. Deeply lamented by many sorrowing followers, who hereby place their regret on record."

The late Mr. Chamberlain was one of the few men who insisted upon introducing business and time-saving methods into the routine of the Colonial Office. Finding that the number of daily despatches to the Governors of Colonies laid before him for signature at the end of a busy day was so large as to take up an hour or more, he conceived the daring idea of having his name stamped on them. A fac-simile of his signature was made in steel and with this his private secretaries were able to give the official sanction to important documents. One overseas Governor objected on the ground that legal state documents required the actual signature, but Mr. Chamberlain adhered to his practical view of things when an enquiry reached the office for advice on the best nail manufacturers. According to British state department etiquette no advice should be given; but Mr. Chamberlain gave instructions to tell the writer that Nettie's nails would hold like grim death.

Anyone who knows how difficult it is to deal with the Colonial office in a prompt straight-forward way like this, will realize what temerity was required for reform: even in such minutiae.

NOVEL PICKLES.

Something novel in pickled Brussels sprouts. Trim, wash and drain quite dry as many as you require. Put into pan, sprinkle well with salt and let remain for 24 hours. Drain off moisture, and if you think they are too salty, put in a colander and pour cold water over them and drain. Place in a pan and cover with boiling vinegar, seasoned with pepper, a little bruised ginger, a bay leaf and enough sugar to take off the extreme acid of the vinegar. When the pickles are cold, put in jars and tie down.—Los Angeles Express.
