—PORT HILL.—Amid manifestations of deep sorrow the remains of Jack Gorill, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Gorill, Northam, who lost his life in November last and was laid to rest in the Episcopate Cemetery at Port Hill on Friday 6th inst. The funeral cortege was the largest witnessed in the neighbourhood for years, and showed the great esteem in which the young man was held and the wide spread sympathy which had been aroused through the calamity. The services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Soden, assisted by Mr. Morris, the Organizing Secretary. The hymns, "Hush, Blessed are the Dear," "Till He come," and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" were sung, while a short sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Soden, the lessons being read by Mr. Morris. At the graveside a touching ceremony took place. After the burial service, Brother James Phillips, the Chaplain of deceased's Lodge conducted a brief ceremony under the Order and at its termination the members filed round the grave, each dropping on the casket a small piece of orange ribbon, their silent tribute to a departed brother. Several beautiful wreaths were placed on the grave. Much regret is expressed that so promising a young life has been thus cut short, and much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Gorill and family in their bereavement.

PARIS, May 10.—Very long waistcoats are seen on tailored suits. They invariably have high collars of organdie muslin, somewhat resembling the pierrot. Knitted waistcoats, in brightly colored artificial silks, are among the novelties, and one example ended in a deep knotted fringe, but these garments demand a very slim figure. SUMMERSIDE Y. M. C. A. Following is the report of the County Secretary for the Prince County Y. M. C. A. for the month of April 1921.

Gentlemen: I have the honor to report as follows for the month of April.

I took over work early in the month, and have spent considerable time on foundation work. I work in Summerside, and programmes have been mapped out with a view of attaining the greatest benefit to the largest number of boys, by means of co-operation, and intensive use of resident forces.

There were in Summerside, in the vicinity of 80 organized boys when I came and during the month other C. S. E. T. groups have been formed, which include the boys of the Baptist, Anglican and Christian Churches, bringing organized membership up to over one hundred.

This brings practically all the boys actively attached to the Protestant churches of Summerside under C. S. E. T. training. In addition one night a week is given to all the boys of the town, with a view to reaching some who are not at present attached to any organization. On this evening, games, stunts and physical training are carried out, followed by a sing song, and the meeting closed by a devotional period. We also plan on having a Boys' and men's meeting on Sunday afternoons, at which live messages on vital questions, will be given to the boys and their fathers, by different speakers.

In Summerside there is also a considerable interest in Girls' Work and C. G. I. T. and other groups are being formed under the direction of a co-operating committee of ladies. Valuable results are expected from the co-operation of the Boys' and Girls' Work Committees during the summer months.

On April 14th I was to meet the County Committee, but unfavorable weather, and roads made it impossible for the outside members to get in. Met Summerside local committee twice during month, and much valuable work was accomplished.

Your secretary has specialized on three centres, Summerside, Kensington, and Malpeque during the month and in all three has found a creditable interest. Resident clergy are enthusiastic.

I visited Kensington on the 15th and again on the 20th and found a good interest, both on the part of the boys and adults, and on my second visit, I found the girls also interested and two C. G. I. T. groups were formed in addition to the re-organization of the Trail Rangers and the decision to re-organize the Tuxis as soon as a leader can be procured.

I spent the 25th and 26th with the United Victors of Darnley and Sea View. Met the square of the evening of the 25th at the regular meeting. Much credit is due them for the work they have accomplished. The way in which they carry on their business meeting is especially worthy of mention. On the afternoon of the 26th we carried out the events of the Night.

CITY OF CALGARY INSURES EMPLOYEES

A generous act was recently performed by the City of Calgary, Alberta, when group insurance was provided for the civic employees under arrangements with the Canada Life Assurance Company. The insurance represents about \$1,500,000 and not only guarantees the payment of the insurance to the dependents of the employees in event of death, but also provides for the policies to be paid in case they should be totally disabled through sickness, accident or any other cause.

Calgary is, at present, the largest City in Canada providing this form of protection for their employees. The City of Westmount, Que., also insured their employees last year in the Canada Life under the Canadian municipalities have the same plan under consideration. Many cities in the United States have been carrying group insurance some time past.

An important feature of the group plan is that many unemployed persons are thereby included for insurance who would otherwise be debarred from enjoying this protection for their homes or families.
