**MILL SOLD.**—It is understood that G. W. Bowness has sold his saw and planing mill at Stanley Bridge to John Warren of Bradalbane.

This will about finish the shipping of produce from New London harbor this season.

A correspondent from Cavendish writes:—Even if the government can get security from the Dominion Packing Co. that will secure the province against any possibility of loss this will not reconcile the producers of cattle hogs and sheep to be handed over to a monopoly that will be in a position to take about what tolls they like from both producers and consumers. The security to the province is a small matter compared with security from monopoly, which we forfeit if the government gives the guarantee and shuts out competition in the packing business.

The Commencement number of the Transcript announced the election of Miss Effie K. Price as Associate Dean at Monnett for the year. Miss Price's engagement this summer to Mr. Thomas S. Glodding, of Montclair, N. J., and her consequent resignation, which was accepted by the trustees of the University, have led to the election of Prof. Louisa Holman Richardson to fill the vacancy occasioned by Miss Price's resignation. Prof. Richardson is a woman of ability and of wide experience in working with young women, while her educational advantages have been unusual. Her early life was spent at Winchester, Mass. She graduated from the High School at that place, and later took the degree of A. B. at Boston University. She taught Latin and Greek at Laseil Seminary for two years, after which she returned to Boston University for graduate study. She received the first European Fellowship of Association of Collegiate Alumnae, and spent two years in travel in Europe, and in study at Newham College, Cambridge, England. Upon her return to America, she received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Boston University. Since that time she has been Professor of the Latin Language and Literature in Carleton College, Northfield, Minn., at various times filling the position of Acting Dean, in the absence of the Dean. Miss Richardson is a Methodist and an active member in the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. She has been greatly interested and prominently identified with the work of the Young Women's Christian Association, acting as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the State of Minnesota. 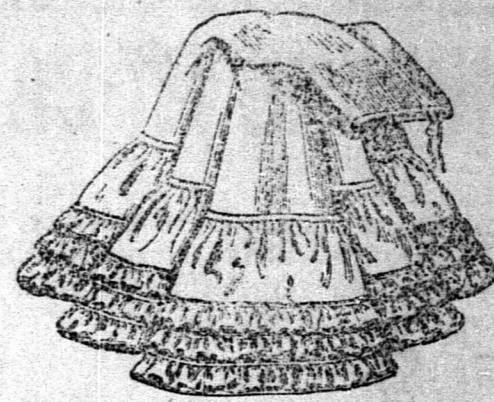
