Scout News and Notices

The regular monthly meeting of the Executive Committee was held on Monday afternoon, in the Scout headquarters, 101 Queen Street, when many matters dealing with the welfare of the Association, were dealt with.

Mr. George Brady was named as Chairman of the Badge Board, in place of Mr. William Warren, who has found it necessary to resign. Mr. Brady will meet with Scouts and Leaders each Wednesday evening, between six and seven p. m., to arrange for Examiners. It is hoped that full advantage will be made of the Board, to increase the number of Proficiency Badge Tests and First Class Scout Tests.

It has been announced that a special Badge and Certificate, bearing the present King's picture, will be issued to all Scouts passing the King's Scout Badge from September 1936 to July 1 1937. Scout Leaders are endeavoring to increase the number of King's Scouts during Coronation Year.

The Executive Committee dealt at some length, with plans for the appointment of a permanent official for organization and training work in the Province. The increased activities of Scouting in the Province will necessitate an appointment in the near future.

In all probability the Maritime Scout Leaders Training Camp, and the Akela (Cub Leaders) Training Camp, will be held at Lake William, Nova Scotia, in July. It is not too early to be planning to take in one of those important camps.

During the past week two new charters were issued. Charter No. 32 to the Presbytery of the Prince-Edward United Church of Canada at Malpeque with Rev. Norman J. Thomas as Scoutmaster and Charter No. 33 to the citizens of the village of O'Leary with Rupert McNeill as Scoutmaster. This makes a total of 13 chartered groups in the Province. Most of the groups are composed of Cub Pack and a Scout Troop, while two of the groups also include a Rover Crew. Renewal stickers for the Charters held by the different Groups for the year 1937 have been issued during the past week.

Most of the Troops and Packs have been inactive during the Christmas holidays, but will now be getting down to regular routine work for the winter months, consisting very largely of work on the various tests and proficiency badges.

The first Rover Crew at their regular meeting on Wednesday will have Professor Patterson as their guest. Professor Patterson will give a talk on a trip which he made to Italy some time ago.

Several new members have been added to this crew since the fall activities started.

The St. James Rover Sea Crew are busily engaged fitting up a den in the basement of the St. James Church. They have fitted up ample seating accommodation and Ralph Dumont has painted a very attractive marine scene. This crew has made a start on their Snipe.

Through the courtesy of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau office space has been provided for the Scout Association, in the present Travel Bureau Headquarters. The accommodations are excellent, and the location a good one.
