Canadiens Take Third Straight Victory In Stanley Cup Finals

CHICAGO, April 9—(CP)—The Montreal Canadiens swept to their third straight victory over the Chicago Black Hawks in the Stanley Cup hockey finals tonight winning 3-2 on a pair of goals in the final period.

A crowd of 17,994 jammed Chicago Stadium for the battle, which put the Canadiens within one game of the Cup in the best-of-seven series.

The winning marker came at 6:43 of the final period when Phil Watson, Montreal centre took a pass from wing Ray Getliffe and fired the puck over goalie Mike Karakas of the Hawks after the latter had fallen to the ice.

Maurice Richard, star Canadian right wing established a new Stanley Cup scoring record in getting an assist on Montreal's first goal by the Blake early in the second chapter. He now has 15 points for the playoffs, one better than the former mark held jointly by Syl Apps of Toronto and Don Grosso of Detroit.

The Hawks went out in front 1-0 after five minutes, 14 seconds of the first period and maintained the edge until Blake's marker in the second.

Early in the final stanza the Hawks again went ahead, young Johnny Harris, rookie right wing, passing one through from the blue line.

Barely a minute and a half later, however, the Canadiens knotted the count a second time on defenceman Mike McMahon's unassisted goal. Then came Watson's winning shot from about 10 feet out.

Goalie Bill Durnan of Montreal staged his usual spectacular net minding and proved to be the difference between the teams—he has been throughout the series.

Buffalo Takes A.H.L. Finals Three Straight

CLEVELAND, April 9—(AP)—Buffalo Blizzards swept the Cleveland Barons 3-1 and made it three in a row in the best of seven game hockey league championship before a crowd of 11,270 fans here Saturday night.

In two previous games the Blizzards won 4-2 and 12-2. Buffalo has racked up 24 goals in three games. The fourth was played at Buffalo tonight.

Radio Officer Is Murdered

SALFORD, Lancashire, England, April 9—(CP Cable)—The body of James William Percy, 48 year old chief radio officer, was found in the cabin of a ship here Saturday night and police said he had been murdered at least two days previously.

Percy is said to have been a native of Nova Scotia but further details of his Canadian background were not available immediately.

The cabin showed evidence of a struggle and Percy's head had been battered.

HALIFAX, April 9—(CP)—James William Percy, killed in the believed here to be a native of Halifax, Nfld., who worked as a wireless operator for some years in Eastern Canada.

An official of the department of transport recalled Percy was employed from 1929 until 1933 or 1934, after which he was transferred to work on the coast.

Before joining the department, Percy worked here with the Maritime Company.

DeGaulle, Giraud Fight Flares Out Once Again

ALGIERS, April 9—(A.P.)—Gen. Charles De Gaulle discharged Gen. Henri Honoré Giraud today by abolishing his post of commander-in-chief and appointing him inspector general of the French armed forces—a post which Giraud bitterly rejected.

In a sharp formal letter, Giraud who escaped from France in 1941 to take over leadership of the French forces on the Allied side in North Africa, refused to recognize De Gaulle's abolition of his position and charged De Gaulle with violating French republican law as well as French National Committee ordinances.

Hull Appeals To Americans Re Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, April 9—(AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull, fighting for a post-war policy of international collaboration in the "organized peace," appealed to the American people tonight not to let the controversies of an election year create disunity and destroy their effectiveness in world affairs.

Once before in our lifetime, Hull said in his discussion of foreign policy, "we fell into disunity and became ineffective in world affairs because of election year controversies. We failed to do what we should have done because we were too busy preparing for the next election."

Hull said that neither the President nor the Congress should be divided by the most detailed of American officials since the war started, was built on the assumption that the United States, Britain, Russia and China would cooperate for peace as well as for war and if they do not, Hull said, there is "no hope of avoiding any other great conflict in the next 20 to 25 years."

Hull's address assured the country that neither he nor President Roosevelt "have made or will make any secret agreement, or comment political or financial."

Remember When

Chicago Black Hawks, managed by Tommy Gorman, won the Stanley Cup 11 years ago tonight by defeating Detroit Red Wings 1-0 in the final game of the playoffs in Chicago. It was the first time the Hawks had captured the title. The next year, Gorman was fired and Montreal Maroons won the cup again.

ZION PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

All services of worship at Zion Church on Easter Sunday were well attended by devout and rejoicing worshippers as they celebrated the triumph of Christ in his resurrection from the dead. EASTER DAY AT ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL

The Easter Day services began with two celebrations of the Blessed Sacrament of the altar at 7 and 8 a. m., so as to enable all communicants to keep the rule of the Church of England.

The church was filled for the chief service of the day, the Choral Eucharist at 11 a. m. This was preceded by a procession, led by the cross-bearer of the choir, with banner-bearers and the Priest vested in a cope of gold and purple, attended by two boys in white, carrying a model of the ark.

For this "Come Ye Faithful, Raise the Strain of Triumphal Gladness" was sung. "Light Glistening Morn Bedecks the Sky" was used as an introit and the music of the Eucharist was Woodward's fine setting. The celebrant was the incumbent, who was vested in a gorgeous chasuble embroidered in gold. He also preached the sermon.

Evensong was sung at 7 p. m. Appropriate psalms were chanted to plainsong tones, and the office hymn "The Lamb's High Banquet Galed to Share" to its appropriate Gregorian melody. Rathbone's setting of the evening canticles was used for magnificent and nunc dimittis. Some verses of the well known hymn "The Strife O'er the Battle Done" were rendered in descant.

The subject of the sermon was "The Easter Alleluia."

Before the blessing a procession was made from the chancel, through the nave, back to the altar, before which a solemn Te Deum of thanksgiving was sung.

The altar and its surroundings were resplendent in festal array—a magnificent frontal embroidered in silver, beautiful flowers, shining of light from many candles, added to the beauty and dignity of the Sanctuary.

All the music of the festival was most creditably rendered by the choir and it was a great pleasure to have Mr. Walter MacNutt at the organ.

In these Easter services a sincere attempt has been made to present the worship of the church as a fitting offering to Almighty God.
