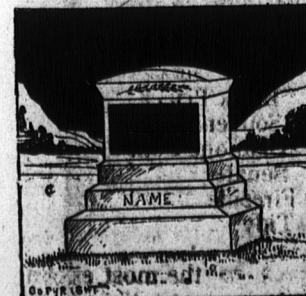

He adds that a small barrel of salt water will lay a thick dust as a cushion of fresh water and keep it laid far better. Further, the salt water keeps down the weeds on side streets and saves money spent in cutting them. And again, the salt water is available when the dust nuisance is at its height and fresh water is scarce. And yet again, the salt water hardens the streets. So let us have an efficient water cart and the salt water."

### PTF. RUSSEL SNOW WRITES INTERESTING LETTER FROM ENGLAND

The following is a letter written by Pte. Russel Snow, 105th Battalion, England:

Shorncliffe, England.  
NOT POSTED

After a long time from writing, I now start to tell you a little news. We left Valcartier on July 13th, and landed here at camp on the 25th. We are now only a little over forty miles from the firing line. We can hear the big guns roaring away. It just sounds like thunder in the distance.

Well, you never know who you will meet when you get travelling. I met

Allan Wadman. He is in the 106th, and then I met with another bigger surprise than that, for I also met Jim Rodgers, Adrian's father. He is going to take Adrian with him, for they cannot keep them apart, that is if they want to go together. I also met Mont Hennessey. I did not have time to talk to him, only to shake hands and ask him how things were over in France, but he has not gone over yet; he looks fine.

I tell you, we never did any soldiering until we came here; it was play before, but it is all different now. We had a lovely trip over, from the best voyages they have made this year. We could have crossed the ocean in Charlie Miller's gasoline boat, it was so smooth all the way. We left Halifax on Saturday, July 13, and arrived in Liverpool on Monday, July 25th. This is one of the finest countries I have ever seen. Every part of it is cultivated to perfection, all kinds of crops growing and large hop farms. They certainly look handsome the way they are done. I can't explain to you how they look, but I hope to be able to tell you some day.

I will tell you a little more about our trip on the train. The cars are not like ours at home; each car is divided into rooms, and 10 seats in each room, and eight passengers to each room. We saw some lovely places on our way out, and we were cheered by thousands of women and girls.

We are now in what they call a quarantine camp for a few days, to see if there is any disease among us before we go to our quarters. I must say I am going to have it easy for a few days, for there was a case of measles broke out in our camp, and there were nine of us sent to the quar-

antine camp today. It is just eight o'clock here (that means it would be one o'clock at night at home), and I am lying on the grass writing this. This is the first we have been allowed to write, so we are all busy writing.
