Firm Name Changed
 By Supplementary Letters Patent issued by the Secretary of State for Canada, May 11, 1926, the name of the "Canadian Consolidated Rubber Company Limited," Montreal, was changed to "Dominion Rubber Company, Limited." This change of name does not change the personnel or policy of the Company but it brings the operations of the parent company and its General Purchasing, Manufacturing and Selling departments under the common name, "Dominion Rubber Company, Limited." A corresponding change of name will be made in the Sales Divisions of the Company, the "Dominion Rubber System (Maritime) Limited" being changed to "Dominion Rubber Company (Maritime) Limited," thus linking the parent company more directly with the selling and distribution of the "Dominion" Rubber Products.

BIBLE CIRCULATION
 The British and Foreign Bible Society has issued a statement for its 122nd Annual Meeting which shows that the total issues of the Society in complete Bibles, New Testaments and small portions (at least one complete book of Scripture) reached last year the wonderful output of 10,452,733—more than double those announced 25 years ago and an increase of 412,158 for the year. In no previous period in the Society's history were so many English Bibles sold as last year.

At Rotary
 At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Mr. Walter P. Doull, who gave an impressive twenty minutes address on "Fire Zones," and spoke somewhat along the same lines as in the letters which appeared recently in the Patriot.
 Mr. Doull exhibited two maps, showing the proposed new zones in color. He first gave a historical sketch of the survey of Charlottetown made in 1765. He declared that although Charlottetown has advanced since then, she still clings to the old wards, which were mapped out just 160 years ago, when the population of the island was not equal to the population of Ward 5 today, which is 4,000.

A contest between the two is being arranged.

Airship Aid Sealers
 (Canadian Press.)
 ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 20.—Airships played an important role in the garnering of this year's harvest of seals, one of the greatest in the history of the industry. Hitherto the annual sealing expedition has been somewhat of a lottery owing to the uncertainty as to the location of what is known locally as the "main patch". But with the advent of the airship and its employment in the detection of the herds this uncertainty has to a great extent disappeared. The old time sealing captain, trusting to luck and intuition in forcing his vessel through the ice to the point where the young seals, floating down from the Arctic, were thickest, was at first disposed to look askance at the prospect of having anything so new fangled as an airship to assist him in his work. His fears were short lived, however, and this year the airships discovered the great majority of the patches worked. The total catch was 205,548 seals.
