

STANLEY SAILS FOR HUDSON'S BAY

OTTAWA, July 4.—The government steamer Stanley sails from North Sydney on July 9 for the Hudson Bay. The Stanley will cruise about in the bay, reaching Port Nelson in time to take the minister of railways aboard. Mr. Cochrane will come back by boat.

CANADA TO ASSIST MOTHER COUNTRY.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 5.—Robert L. Borden, Canadian Premier, with his colleagues, J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine; C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice; and L. P. Pelletier, Postmaster General, arrived here last evening. At the London terminus waiting to greet the Canadian Statesmen were Lord Strathcona and many Canadians. Mr. Borden is the most heralded Colonial visitor to come to London for years. The press and the public are making much of his pronouncement, "I stand for a Great Navy," which is interpreted that Canada is prepared to make a handsome contribution to the British Navy in the shape of two more Dreadnaughts. Mr. Borden, however, is reluctant as to the form in which Canadian assistance to the Mother Country is to be offered.

A SHARK ENCOUNTER.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 2.—After fighting desperately for two hours with a grown man-eating shark, which had become embroiled in their fishing nets off Angel Island, five fishermen finally conquered the unusual catch and saved their little fishing smack from capsizing and placing them at the mercy of the infuriated thing.

The man-eater was towed to Meigs' wharf by the fishermen after it had been beaten into insensibility with boat hooks, and while being pulled ashore revived and was put to death with several rifle bullets. The shark measured twelve feet over all and weighed 600 pounds.

Although the common mud shark is often hooked on fishing lines and caught in nets by fishermen in San Francisco Bay, the capture of a grown man-eater inside the harbor is unusual, and one of them has not been encountered in the bay for several years.

The fishermen are of the opinion that the victim of their nets strayed into the bay from the open sea in search of new varieties of food; they also assert that they are thankful they did not fall for the water while the shark was cutting about. The men in the fishing smack which brought the shark to land were Salvatore Ballsterri and his three brothers Prite, Soliotti and Moriono Ballsterri, and Vittorio Sarchi.

Two nets were torn almost to shreds by the shark, and in order to emmesh the giant and bring him near enough to attack with clubs the fishermen sacrificed a third net.

We were afraid that if we let him go he would sweep our smack to pieces with his tail, said Salvatore Ballsterri. This would have left us at his mercy, and as we could see that he was ferocious we could take no chances. There is no doubt that had we been overturned the shark would have injured us and might have killed one of us.

The captors of the shark declared that the battle, which raged without cessation until the catch was unconscious, was terrific.

It looked bad several times for us, said one of the men. The first we knew of the shark's presence was when one of the nets was almost swept away. Then we started out to get him. He had chances to get away, but seemed to want to wreck our boat, and it was lucky that we succeeded in killing him.

The big shark is the biggest ever captured in the bay, the oldest fishermen say. The owners of the fish found a ready market for it through a Chinese grocery merchant. The flesh of the shark is highly esteemed as a delicacy by Chinese, the meat being smoked and dried.
